Draneau Inlet Annexation Plans

MONTRÉAL (CP)—A ceaseless struggle in the Draneau Inlet area of the Montreal and west of the 20 suburbs that straddles Montreal Island. Mayor Jean Drapeau's campaign to make the Inlet "big city" was suspended in mid-January when the Quebec government announced a three-man commission will make a fresh attempt to find an acceptable pattern. Pierre Laporte, Quebec's minister of metropolitan affairs, suggested a commission be made up of one Montreal delegate, one representative of the suburbs and a chairman appointed by his department. It will be up to them to find some form of metropolitan organization to fit the common needs and sometimes conflicting interests of the cities and villages involved. Metropolitan government has already been tried and found wanting. The Montreal Metropolitan Corporation, never given much power to begin with, has become progressively weaker in the years and now has less than 100 members. More than 200,000 people are governed by a regulation governing closing hours of stores on the island. BUILT EXPRESSWAY The original idea was to fashion the corporation after Toronto's metro, which gave it powers to run public

transportation, planning, parks, sewer and water systems and other major housing developments. With a victory behind him, Mr. Drapeau stepped up his campaign for major housing development. Some contended their financial position and public services were better than Montreal's and that they would lose through annexation. Mayors of 27 of the 30 suburbs held a meeting last Dec. 29 and declared unanimously "in favor of the maintenance of local autonomy." They deny the existence of numerous municipal problems on the island, said Mayor Resnais of Dawson of Mount Royal. "We're willing to pour our resources. But we certainly are willing to have them confiscated." Underfunded by criticism, Mr. Drapeau walked and won the village council of Saraguay, a wooded residential suburb of 289 acres on the north of Mount Royal and Saraguay.
