## Western Hospital Addition Approved By Commission

**ALBERTON BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
Plans for the construction of an extension to the Western Hospital at Alberton have been approved by the Hospital Services Commission of Prince Edward Island and tenders are to be called shortly.

The new three-storey addition will be of brick construction and will more than double the capacity of the hospital and also provide more accommodation for an increased nursing staff.

In order that the inside finishing can be carried on during the winter. A new main entrance will be provided in the extension which will connect the present building to the nurses home. Outpatients, surgical and medical units will be in the new section. The lab and main office will remain in the present part of the building as will space for chronically ill, pediatrics, medical dept, diet kitchen, main kitchen, bake room and refectory.
