## Discussed Question Of High School Establishment

Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, assistant Director of Education, and director of curriculum, was the principal speaker at a meeting held at Crapaud Wednesday evening called by the Crapaud-Victoria Board of Trade. The meeting was for the purpose of determining the interest of the people in the establishing of a Central High School in that area. The president of the Board, B.J. Trowsdale, presided.

Mr. MacKenzie explained in detail the policies of the Department affecting High Schools in the Province, and gave a comprehensive outline of the factors involved in the setting up of such a High School in any particular area. He also discussed several other matters of a related nature with a view to providing sufficient whole question might be considered by well-informed groups at later meetings.

Following Mr. MacKenzie's address, a discussion period was held at the conclusion of which it was agreed that the district should meet again early in December. A large representation of people was in attendance from surrounding districts which, among others, included Victoria, Hampton, Westmount, Lady Fene, Kelly's Cross, Desable, Albany Rural, Albany Village and Augustine Cove.
