The population of Great Britain and Ireland, according to the report of the Registrar General, was in 1879 in the neighborhood of 34,000,000. The registered voters for the same year was 2,999,219.

THE Amherst Boot and Shoe Co. are now busy with their spring trade. This establishment has been doing a thriving business for the last number of years, and now employs 63 hands. The strikes, so much heard of among mechanics in other parts, are unknown here; many of the workmen have been steadily employed since the factory was started, and have now comfortable houses—Maritime Sentinel.

THE meeting of the Educational Institute, held in the Upper Prince Street School Building, on Saturday evening, the 17th inst., was the most interesting and profitable of the meetings held in connection with the Institute. The subject for discussion was "History in Schools, the place it should occupy in the course of study, and the best methods of teaching it." Rev. G. W. Hodgson, in opening the subject, referred to the importance of History as a study, the best methods of teaching it, and the object the teacher should have in view in teaching History. Hon. A. A. McDonald read an admirable paper on the same subject. A lively discussion followed, which was participated in by several of the members.

A LUCKY CAPE BRETONER.—A young Mr. Ball, of Ball's Creek, Cape Breton County, has just fallen heir to the title and estates of Sir William Keith Ball, Sir Wm. was the second Baronet of the United Kingdom. The title was created in 1801. Sir Wm. was a son of the 1st baronet by the daughter of John Wilson, Esq., of Westminster. He was born in 1791; succeeded his father in 1809. The first baronet was a distinguished naval officer, Rear-Admiral of the Blue, and Governor of the Island of Malta. Sir William's residences were 40 Upper Seymour Street, London, and Blofield, Norfolk. He died a few years ago, and his estates were inherited by his brother, Mr. Alex. Ball. The latter having died a few years since, the next of kin, the Mr. Ball referred to, comes in for the estates of Sir William.—Truro Sun.

Our Truro correspondent writes: "The hotel keepers and their friends are jubilant over the late decision of the Supreme Court of Canada. Liquor is now sold openly, and the war is considered to be over, at least, by the liquor dealers. There are numerous reports in circulation to the effect that the town will have large bills to foot, as the result of the war against liquors. The friends of the traffic, and there are more of them than most persons supposed, are making great efforts to alarm the citizens by picturing the state of affairs that will exist when the bills have to be paid."

Information has reached the British Government to the effect that Cashmere has lately been the scene of Russian intrigue. The weakness and mismanagement of the Maharajah and the suffering among the people produced by recent famines furnished the opportunity for intermeddling. This looks as if the Russians were determined, by whatever means, to obtain a footing in India. Cashmere is the meeting ground of the Turanian and Aryan races, and is a most interesting country not only from the scope it affords to ethnological research, but from its varied natural features and productions. The territories of the Maharajah include not only Cashmere proper, but Jummoo, Ladakh, Baltistan and Gilgit. Its entire area is estimated at 68,000 square miles.

The King of Siam leaves Bangkok on the 23rd, on a man-of-war, for Singapore, thence by a boat of the Messageries Maritimes to Marseilles, thence to Berlin, where he will arrive about June 5th, and be received by the German Emperor. From Berlin he will go to Brussels and London. On July 1st, he will embark at Southampton, on an American man-of-war, for America. He will be accompanied by a splendid retinue, among whom will be several royal Princes, the Ministers of War and Foreign Affairs, and one dozen prominent noblemen. He will remain three weeks in America, going South as far as Richmond, west as far as Chicago and North into Canada. He will go to Lisbon late in August, visiting Rome in October, and returning to Siam in December. His visit to America is the result of an earnest invitation, extended by the ex-President, as he was the King's guest in Siam.

Financial.

The excess of this years lumbering operations on the Tobique River, N. B. over that of last season is estimated at 1,000,000 feet. Beverage Bros. have cut 3,000,000 feet of spruce; George Baird, 1,300,000 feet. This season has witnessed great activity in the birch timber trade in Victoria County. On the Tobique River, Beverage Bros. have felled 1,100 tons of birch. The amount of lumber cut on the Madunakeag the present season exceeds the amount got out in 1878 and '79 by 240,000 feet. On the Aroostook River 8,000,000 feet of spruce have been cut this winter for Samuel King, of the Mosquito Cove Mill, St. John.

The Nova Scotia legislators were paid at the rate of \$11 per day for the session just closed.
