### Oil Company President To Lecture At College

The annual Robertson Lecture at Prince of Wales College next week will be delivered by W. O. Twaites, president of Imperial Oil Limited and one of Canada's top business executives. The lecture which is free to the public will be given on Tuesday evening at 8:30 in the College auditorium.

Mr. Twaites, who has been with Imperial since 1933, became its president in 1960. Aside from his wide business interests, he has been closely associated with the University of Toronto, the Chemical Institute of Canada, the Canadian Geographic Society, the Canadian Inter-American Association, the Royal Canadian Institute, the Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Association, and the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

### Fall Lobster Landings Said Poorest In Years

The fall lobster season currently in effect on the south side of the province has been called one of the poorest in years.

The season began Aug. 10 and runs for two months.

It has been learned that many fishermen have pulled their gear and stopped fishing, some of them as long as three weeks ago.

Figures for the month of August this year indicate that the 885,509 pounds caught last month compare with 926,430 pounds landed in the same month a year ago. That's a drop of four percent in poundage, but the landed value is down approximately 10 percent, a department spokesman said.

Adding to the problems is the fact that fishermen are receiving 35 to 40 cents per pound, considerably less than they had expected.

The August value this year, to the fishermen, of \$502,182 compares with \$557,569 pounds in August 1964.

Wilson Shea, Tignish said that the best catches are running about 100 pounds to a boat and that is in the area between Miminegash and Howard's Cove, and across to Bay St. Anne on the New Brunswick side. (Howard's Cove is not far from West Cape, where the Provincial Championship plowing match was held earlier this month.)

**FAR BELOW AVERAGE**  
Catches were reported poor from Skinner's Pond to North Cape, and farther east along the shore, which included the Borden to Victoria area. Mr. Shea estimated that the catch this season to date is down from 80,000 to 100,000 pounds below last season, which was considered to be no better than average.

But the drop in catches is much more serious in September it has been learned and the figures at the end of the season are expected to reflect both the unusually poor fishing and the less-than-expected price per pound, though a price of 55 to 60 cents per pound would have been considered fantastically good a couple of years ago.

Figures for the two-month South Shore season last year are 1,660,462 pounds of lobsters landed, for a total value of \$946,745.

**SOME GOOD CATCHES**  
Stories through May and June indicated that catches were most unusually good in a part of the West Prince area, particularly the Alberton area, were average, or less than that, along much of the rest of the North Shore, and were far below average along the usually highly productive South shore.

Final figures reveal, though, that the good catches on most of the North shore more than made up for a drop on the South coast fishing area.
