

# Student Union Offices May Be Forced To Move

The regular Student Union Council meeting was last Wednesday, March 12, in the Kelly Building. After the minutes were approved, the first order of business was discussed, that being Jane MacCormac's contract and pay raise. After much bantering, a motion by Wade MacLaughlan gave Jane \$525.00 per month starting April 1st, 1975 and a 10% raise effective

April 1, 1976.

The council was then informed of the teach-in to be held Thursday March 13. Then there was a motion made by Rick Willis that the student senators should request that the Rules of Procedure for the Senate be documented and presented to Senate. It was also approved that Mickey Place be re-hired as a fulltime Business Manager with his con-

tract and salary to be negotiated.

One of the biggest orders of business was the moving of the S.U. offices to fourth floor Main. The reason for this was so that the residents of Memorial could have their basement back so better facilities could be made available for them. This proposal was approved providing that the university would do some-

thing for the residents of Memorial Hall.

The date for a by-election was decided for March 26th. The positions open are for one science rep. and one education rep.

The recommendations for next year's Campus Police Members were tabled and further information was requested before they are presented again. The next meeting is Sunday, March 23rd.

## Official Naming Ceremony For Robertson Library

The official naming of the 'New Library' occurred at 3:00 P.M. on Friday, March 14, 1975. The main lobby was the scene of the unveiling of the portrait of Dr. Samuel Napier Robertson, B.A., M.A., L.L.D., 1869-1937. The portrait was painted by Mrs. Jadi Bibily.

It was attended by many of U.P.E.I., the provincial government and by the family and friends of the late

Dr. Robertson.

The Hon. C. St. Clair Trainor, chairman of the Board of Governors of U.P.E.I. began the ceremonies with a short speech. He said that the Robertson Library was a milestone in the history of the development of UPEI as Kelly Memorial Library was inadequate for the needs of the university and that the Robertson Library will serve for years and years to come.

He said that it is "fitting to do honour to those who have gone before" and that there was no difficulty in choosing a name for the library. Dr. Samuel Robertson has long been identified with education in P.E.I. and taught for fifty years at Prince of Wales College. In 1901 he became principal of P.W.C. and remained so until his death in 1937. The naming of the library is in recognition to such

service which was rendered by him.

Miss Louise Callbeck, a niece of Dr. Robertson unveiled the portrait of her uncle which is hanging in the main lobby of the library.

Catherine Callbeck, a great-niece of Dr. Robertson addressed a few remarks to the honourable guests, acknowledging the tribute paid to Dr. Robertson in the naming of the library. She said that she was honoured to be among those who were related to Dr. Robertson and hopes that the library will be "a constant reminder of his service for future generations who will all be touched by his legacy."

President R.J. Baker also commented and welcomed Mr. G.D. Steel, principal of P.W.C. from 1937 to 1949 and Msgr. G.A. MacDonald, former president of St. Dunstons' University.

The chief librarian, Mr. Meritt C. Crockett also spoke and extended a formal invitation to outside borrowers who, have borrowed before but because of the lack of resources could not be formally welcomed to feel free to borrow from the library.

Refreshments were then served to all guests in the smoking lounge on the second floor of the Robertson Library.
