

Try To Talk Dulles Into Supporting Terms For Cease-Fire In Indo-China

By HAROLD KING PARIS (Reuters)—France and Britain—at a crucial dinner meeting which lasted almost four hours—tried Tuesday night to talk U. S. State Secretary Dulles into supporting the Indo-China cease-fire terms being worked out behind the scenes at the Geneva conference.

When the talks—with Western unity as the high stakes—ended at 11:15 GMT (7:15 p. m. EDT) Dulles told reporters: "There will be further talks tomorrow morning."

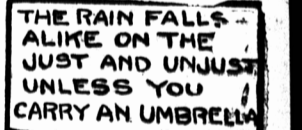
