

Economic Committee Predicts Increase in World Meat Production This Year

LONDON (AP) — World meat production showed a marked rise in 1953 and may increase a little this year, the Commonwealth economic committee reported today.

The United Kingdom continued to be the main importer in 1953, but the market on a large scale to take the greater part of Argentine mutton and much of the Uruguayan production, the survey said.

It also disclosed: United Kingdom meat consumption in 1953 regained the 1950 level. Canada and the United States also showed gains, but there were declines in New Zealand and Uruguay. In Australia and Argentina there was little change.

ARGENTINE AGAIN DOWN

The output of beef and veal in Argentina, Canada, the United Kingdom and the United States increased substantially in 1953, but New Zealand showed a slight reduction. Argentine production dropped for the fourth straight year. Mutton and lamb output in all the main producing countries except the United Kingdom fell appreciably, but there was a general increase in pork production, except in Canada and the United States.

World exports of beef and veal rose sharply in 1953 and 482,000 tons—the highest level since 1949, but they were less than two-thirds of the pre-war figure because of the heavy reduction in shipments from South American countries.

World exports of pork were 141,700 tons—almost double the 1952 figure and 50 per cent above the 1938 level.

BRITISH IMPORTS UP

The continued high level of livestock numbers suggests that world meat production this year may show a small increase. It seems likely that output of beef and veal will be greater than in 1953 while there may be little change for mutton and lamb or pig-meat.

The United Kingdom in 1953 imported nearly 1,300,000 tons of meat, valued at almost \$720,000,000. This compares with 1,100,000 tons

valued at \$548,000,000 the year before.

United Kingdom meat consumption rose to 98 pounds per capita, regaining the 1950 figure, but still about 21 pounds below 1938.

Let's Talk It Over

We wonder if the debates they hold in schools and colleges have not some bad as well as good effects. On the credit side can be cited the indisputable facts that the debates train students to think on their feet, sharpen their powers of rebuttal, and give them poise and greater facility of expression. But the debating game requires that a competitor bring out and display in its most attractive light every argument that strengthens his side of the controversy and to ignore the points of argument that tend to weaken the side he is defending. This is fine in debating, but do we not tend to carry this method into our discussion of controversial subjects, yes, even in our thinking about controversial subjects during our post-school days?

We believe a certain system of program, economical, educational, or what have you, is more desirable than another. We espouse its cause, and though it seems reasonable to suppose that there are good and bad points in both systems, we shut our eyes to the good in the system we attack, and see only its faults. This "black and white" philosophy, that is incapable of seeing any intermediate shades, is pure prejudice. We are probably tainted with some of it ourselves, but for this once, at least, we'd like to throw off some of the fetters by proclaiming our belief that there is indeed something wrong with our system of spelling instruction as the fundamentalists suggest. We have noticed again and again that pupils misspell words in a way that betrays their ignorance of a working knowledge of phonetics. We have no idea where the trouble lies.
