

Sport Echoes From Prince County

The fact that the play-offs for the Little League, Banians and Midgets baseball teams are about to commence reminds us that, in our opinion, there should be a baseball "Bill of Rights" drawn up on behalf of the small centres, such as Kensington, Alberton, Montague, etc. According to the present system, all-star teams from Charlottetown and Summerside compete with teams from the small centres. The chances of one of the smaller places fielding a team to challenge seriously Charlottetown's or Summerside's entry are rather remote. No one could expect the best line players in Kensington, say, to be able to defeat the best nine players in a place as large as Charlottetown. It might happen once in a dog's age but the odds are greatly against it. Consequently there isn't much incentive for the smaller town to organize a team and work hard with it all summer for the sake of entering this one-sided competition at the end of their season's play.

We believe that regulations should be drawn up at the centres, instead of picking all-star teams, should be required to enter only one team in the play-offs for, say, every two or three thousand of the centre's population. Under that system Charlottetown would have to have four or five teams in final competition. Summerside would be required to pick two or three, and those, or the winners of these groups could play against Kensington, Georgetown, etc. Even then, the cards would be stacked slightly against the small centres, but it would at least give them a fairly good chance to gain honor and glory in the Provincial playdowns.

As it stands, not many of the small towns of the Island participate in these play-offs, and the fact that their chances of success are so small might have something to do with their refraining to enter the competition. Kensington, and of late Montague, we believe, have accepted the difficult role of giant-killers, and we must commend their gallantry in so doing, while we deplore the necessity of such a role. How about it, you powers-that-be? If you bring about this sports "Magnificent Cart" your names will go down in Island sports history as the Gladstones and Disraelis of Island sport.

The game that Andy's Aces and George's Gals put on at the Summerside Softball Diamond Thursday evening should do a lot for ladies' softball in this vicinity. Their play demonstrated pretty well what excellent results can be gained when a sports program is carried out with enthusiasm and effort that has been put in ladies' softball in Summerside during the last two years. You often hear people wondering what would happen if Jeffries could be matched with Joe Louis, or Ty Cobb could compete in baseball against Stan Musial. We'd like to see either the girls of the Bobby Sox or Royals of Rangers of four or five years ago. It's one of those dream games which can never be seen, but we feel sure that the result of such a contest would prove conclusively how much ladies' softball has come ahead in Summerside of late years.

The sports program is building up to an exciting pitch here in Summerside. The provincial baseball championships are about to begin, and these together with the Prince Edward Island League play-offs will furnish a lot of important games at Queen Elizabeth Park in the next week or so. Ladies' softball, men's softball, and the Little Leaguers are also in the midst of play-offs, and all of them have their particular following of enthusiastic fans. The golfing fraternity will be entertained by the biggest golf tournament in the history of the town, when golf pros and amateurs from all over the Maritimes will converge on Summerside for three days of competitive golf during the first three days of next week.
