# U.S. Broadcasting Practices Said Deceptive By Probers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Deceptive broadcasting practices apparently flourish throughout the U.S. radio-television industry, say congressional investigators.

What started out as an investigation of payoffs—undercover payoffs to disc jockeys by record makers—they reported, is turning up indications of other questionable activities involving the industry from top to bottom.

A summary of their findings released Monday shows the investigators charge "top 10" record lists are rigged, program officials take payoffs from child actors and other performers, and network executives use their stations to plug outside interests.

The findings are contained in a memorandum from the chief counsel of the House legislative oversight subcommittee to its chairman, representative Oren Harris (Dem. Ark.).

No names appear in the memorandum and no firms or individuals are singled out as dealers in deceit. The document lists in general terms 22 examples of the kind of thing the investigators have uncovered and describes them as "important leads" in the investigation.

Several of the points deal with

the "top 10" and "top 40" record lists featured by disc jockeys, record manufacturers, sellers, disc jockeys and station executives are all charged with playing a part in rigging such lists.

"Allegations are that a systematic approach is made to key retail record sellers throughout the country whereby for money the record sellers will falsely state that a certain record or records are the ones which have been the best sellers," says the memorandum.

Kickbacks, in which performers pay back all or part of their salaries to program officials for the privilege of appearing as unknown, the memorandum indicates. In the case of child actors, it says, the entire payment is sometimes returned to station officials.

### CONTRACT BRIDGE

West dealer, North-South vulnerable.

**NORTH**  
 ♠ A 10 7  
 ♥ A Q J 7 6  
 ♦ A Q 8 6 3

**EAST**  
 ♠ K Q J 7 5 3 2

**SOUTH**  
 ♠ A 8  
 ♥ Q J 4

The bidding:  
 West North East South  
 1♠ 4♣ 4♠ 5♣

Opening lead—ten of spades. This hand occurred in a team of four championship. West decided to open with psychic spade bid and East, not caring whether the bid was on the level or not, jumped to four spades over North's double.

South made the conservative bid of five clubs and bought the contract. West led a spade. Declarer won with the ace and ruffed a spade in dummy. He then led a club to the king, losing to the ace.

He can stand a heart lead coming from East, but not from West. At trick two, therefore, South should lead the ten of clubs and finesse it if West plays low. Suppose the adverse cards are so divided that East wins the jack. Declarer has nothing to worry about: East can do him no harm. A heart return is easy to handle and so is any other lead. Whatever East returns, declarer forces out the ace of clubs and can then claim the balance. The hearts go off on dummy's diamonds.

In the actual hand it turns out that South makes six as a result of a first round club finesse. The extra trick he luckily gains as a result of the safety measure is simply a reward for good behavior. It is a bonus for avoiding the danger hand.

**Back came a heart which declarer finessed. East took the king and returned a heart. South won in his hand, led the ten of clubs, and after lengthy and agonizing thought, finessed. As a result, he made five clubs.**

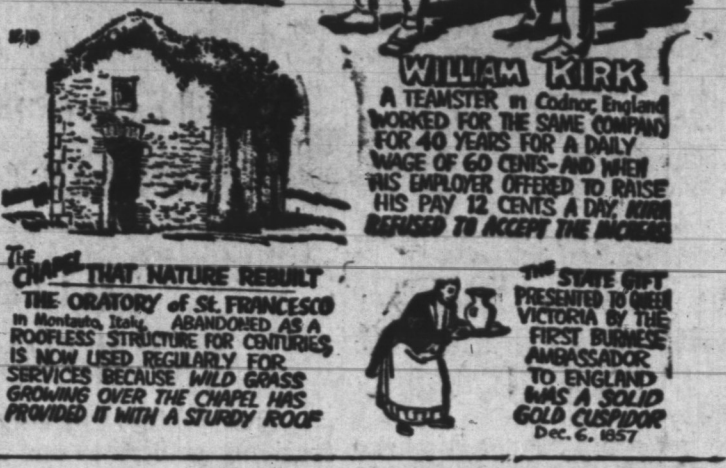
