

11 Toronto Police Taken To Court In Big Roundup

TORONTO (CP) — Eleven Metropolitan police officers were taken to court in handcuffs Friday to have varying charges of breaking, entering, theft and receiving.

None pleaded and bail was set at \$2,000. They were arrested by senior officers in a dramatic through-the-night roundup that climaxed weeks of investigation into a spate of break-in thefts in the North York district of the city.

Police said that goods recovered are valued at more than \$2,000.

Ten of the arrested officers are attached to the Metropolitan Crap Palace, or No. 19 division in northwest Toronto. The 11th is a former North York officer who left the Metro force a month ago to join Vaughan Township police.

SEEK 12th MAN
A 12th man, who left the force two months ago, is being sought. Police said a warrant will be issued for his arrest.

Three other members of the force have been suspended. Arrested were Robert Evans, John Hanna, Jean-Paul Burke, Thomas Patrick Higgins, Arthur James Brockwell, Walter Alexander Hoey, Leonard Wilfred Watts, Roy Edward Williamson, George Horace Bones, William Doherty and Ernest Douglas Bone of Vaughan Township.

Suspended are Walter Travis, James Hermans, and Leo H. Simmons. An inspector said that the charges are considered "holding charges" indicating there is a possibility of further accusations.

The first arrest was made at 8:30 Thursday night by Insp. David Dinan who was transferred from Court St. station to No. 19 last August because of an epidemic of factory break-ins.

INVESTIGATION SNOWBALLS
P. C. Williamson, who was on duty in a scout car, was taken into custody, police said the investigation "snowballed" and by dawn, 10 of the 38 officers attached to No. 19 were under arrest.

All but one of the arrested officers are married. Their service on the force varies from 2½ to eight years.

Insp. Dinan said break-ins which had been prevalent in the factory district of North York stopped about a month ago. Some of the officers arrested were taken from their beds. Some homes were re-visited and seizures made of allegedly stolen property.

Among the items seized were golf clubs, broadloom rugs, tiles, toilet articles and men's clothing. Attorney General Roberts promised an investigation if there were still grounds for inquiry after the men have been tried.

He will be guest speaker at the weekly Rotary Club luncheon at noon and in the afternoon will be taken on a scenic drive.

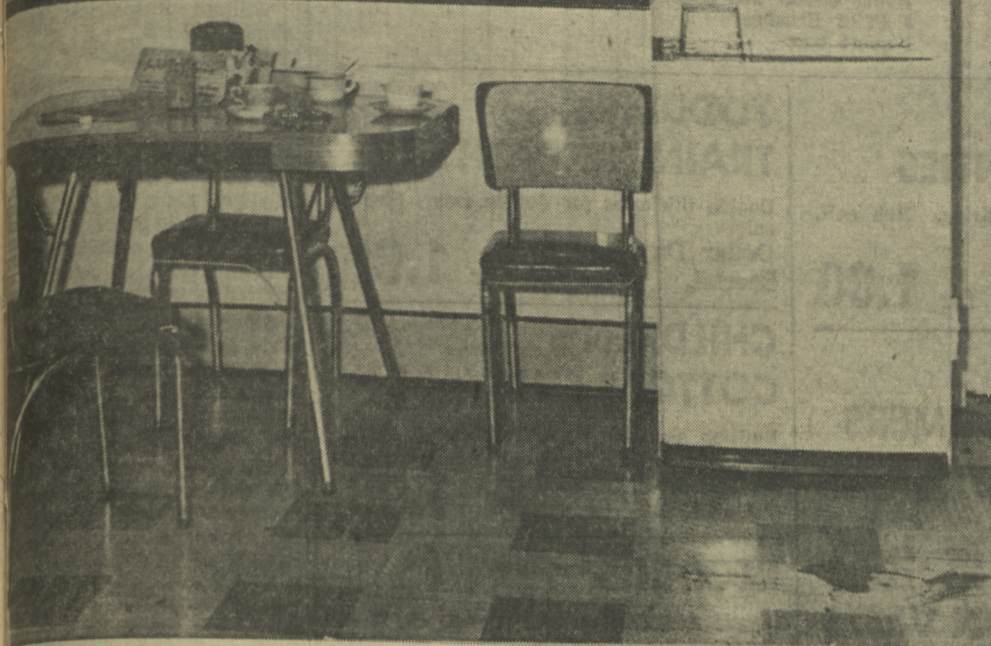

TORONTO (CP) - Canadian construction contract awards totalled a record \$3,044,781,500 in the first 10 months of this year, up \$58,630,000 from the same period last year, says Hugh C. MacLean Building Reports.

The 10-month figure is ahead of last year's 12-month total by \$110,613,400. In October contracts totalled \$365,532,000, up \$115,443,000 from October last year.

Industrial Employment Down Slightly

OTTAWA (CP) - Industrial employment dropped slightly in the period Aug. 1 to Sept. 1 for the first time since the Second World War, affecting payrolls and average weekly wages which followed suit.

Seasonal auto industry declines and strikes and layoffs were behind the reductions, the bureau of statistics said Friday.

The industrial employment index, based on 1949 equaling 100, stood at 121.5 at Sept. 1 in comparison with 122 at Aug. 1.

Average weekly wages and salaries eased to \$70.72 from \$70.76 and the payroll index to 200.8 from 201.6. Industrial employment was 4.8 per cent lower than at Sept. 1, 1957.
