LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

WINTER seems to be lingering for the jubilee celebration.

THE WEATHER.—Light to moderate winds, most north and east; fair and cool.

DRILL.—No. 2 Company G. A., will drill tomorrow (Tuesday) night at eight o'clock sharp instead of tonight.

MONCTON'S ASSESSMENT.—Moncton's assessment valuation shows 1,852 polls; total valuation, \$2,147,350; real estate of residents, \$538,550; real estates of non-residents, \$51,750.

TO BUILD A HOSPITAL.—Yarmouth proposes to celebrate the jubilee year by erecting a hospital. One public-spirited citizen has offered \$5,000 on condition that \$10,000 more be raised. A public meeting has called upon the town council to grant \$3,000, and the balance will be raised in other ways.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The funeral of Mrs. Ninian Patterson, took place yesterday afternoon from her daughters residence to the People's cemetery. The attendance was very large. The service at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. W. J. Kirby. The pall bearers were: Alex. Horse, D. L. Hooper, Jas. Stewart, Henry Lowe, E. G. Purdy, and John McPhail.

CHEESE.—We understand that Hodgson Bros., of Montreal, have an agent on the island to buy cheese, in the person of Mr. A. J. Biffin. Mr. Biffin is a first-class cheese maker and was engaged last season at Stanley Bridge factory. Last year, the cheese bought had to be shipped to Montreal and not paid for until it reached there. This year, we understand, a different rule will prevail—the agent will pay for the cheese on delivery at the shipping point. The different factories will doubtless consult Mr. Biffin and give him a chance to compete with the other buyers in the market. We trust the factories will be able to make good sales in the interests of their patrons.


POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, Gilbert Gallant was arraigned on three separate charges of burglary. Evidence was heard in the Newson and Sander-on & Co., cases this forenoon. This afternoon at half-past two, Gallant will be again arraigned, and the Mi-couche station robbery will come up. Mr. Arthur Peters is watching the case for the crown. Gallant will probably be sent up for trial in the Supreme Court.

Richard Collins and Daniel McMillan were arraigned for being drunk and fighting on the streets. Collins was fined \$12 or 60 days and McMillan \$10 or 50 days. Robert W. Brown vs. John Dalziel. Assault and battery on 30th May, a fine of 50 cents and cost was imposed. Joseph McLeod, Patrick Prunty and H. McEachern were each fined \$4 or 20 days for drunkenness.

SOUSA'S PERLESS BAND.—The band of the World's Fair and Manhattan Beach, an organization of fifty solo artists, headed by the great Sousa himself, will appear in this city this evening. Accompanying the band on this tour are Elizabeth Northrop, soprano, Martini Johnsons, violinist, Arthur Pryor, trombone soloist, and Franz Hell, flugel horn. Can any one resist such an array of musical talent? Sousa's encores are frequent at his concerts. Indeed a Sousa concert without a succession of spirited encore pieces would lack half of its charms, and the conductor of the band has been so quick to recognize the fact that he is always prepared to good-naturedly meet the audience half way in the matter when, like Oliver Twist, it calls for more. The sale of seats has already been very large, and a bumper house is assured at Exhibition building. A special train from Summerside will bring citizens of that town to the great concert. Doors open at half-past seven o'clock, local.
