Threat Seen To Fisheries

BALIFAX (CP)—A leader of Britain's fishing industry warned here that unless action on the implementation of the 12-mile limit is taken, soon over-fishing could kill the Canadian Atlantic fishery. Basil Parks, chairman of Boston Deepsea Fisheries Ltd., of Hull, England, said in an interview there has been up to a 50-per-cent reduction in fish stocks on this side of the Atlantic in the last 15 years. Implementation of the 12-mile limit off would effectively rule out the heavy foreign fishing now taking place and also would allow Canada to effectively supervise the operation of its own fleet. Mr. Parks, whose company controls Acadia Fisheries Ltd. at Mulgrave and Carleton Place, N.S., said thousands of square miles of once valuable fishing grounds in Europe now are "absolutely uneconomical from a fishing point of view." Unless Canada acts soon on the new limit it may find itself in the same position as Britain, which now is importing fish from other countries because of the difficulties its home fleet has encountered in meeting demands. Iceland, which was the first country to impose a 12-mile limit, claims inshore fishing has improved and similar reports come from Norway, he said.

Whitehorse Man Named Commissioner

WHITEHORSE (CP) — Appointment of James Smith, 47, of Whitehorse as the new commissioner of the Yukon was announced by Northern Development Minister Laing. Mr. Laing flew into the territorial capital from Vancouver to announce the appointment. Mr. Smith, who has been general manager of the Tourist Services Ltd. since 1947, has been active in community affairs since coming north in 1940. A native of New Westminster, B.C., he was educated at Burnaby, B.C., and later attended a course on business administration at Banff, Alta. The Yukon had been without a commissioner since July when Gordon Cameron retired to enter private business in Edmonton. Canada's Wheat Crop Estimated At Record

OTTAWA (CP)—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics has raised its 1966 wheat crop estimate to an unprecedented 840,448,000 bushels and said most of it already is in the bin. The revised estimate by the federal agency is more than 40,000,000 bushels higher than its first forecast issued Sept. 2. Both are far higher than the previous record of 728,000,000 bushels in 1963. Hardening up the new estimate, the bureau said the figure is based "to a large extent" on actual field returns since much of the Prairie crop was harvested by the Sept. 15 survey time. The DBS completed its good news report by saying excellent subsequent weather allowed farmers to bring in the 800,000-bushel Prairie wheat crop. It was 30 per cent bigger than last year. Elsewhere, harvesting of all crops is nearing completion under superior weather conditions compared with last year. Much of the wheat-estimate increase was accounted for by Saskatchewan's forecast production of 545,000,000 bushels, compared with 511,000,000 of the original 1966 forecast. In both cases, it is a provincial record. Some of the other crops were lower than last year's production. The figures: with last year's totals following: oats, 382,390,000 bushels, 414,957,000; barley, 286,841,000 bushels, 214,555,000; all rye 14,932,000 bushels, 16,695,000; flaxseed 23,542,000 bushels, 29,254,000; mixed grains, 71,420,000 bushels 74,170,000; rapeseed—24,100,000 bushels, 22,600,000. Forecast wheat output for Manitoba if 68,000,000 bushels is

from 79,000,000 last year. The original 1966 forecast was 84,000,000. Alberta's wheat forecast was raised from 184,000,000 bushels to 189,000,000, both records for the province. Last year's production was 153,000,000.

Canadian RCs Plan Foreign Aid Program


OTTAWA (CP)—The Roman Catholic Church in Canada soon will launch its own foreign aid program, it was announced here. Canada's 76 archbishops and bishops voted unanimously at their annual conference to set up a national fund for community development aid and disaster relief in developing countries. Archbishop Martin Johnson of Vancouver, who proposed the plan, told a news conference the first objective will be "an intensive educational program to bring home to Canadian Catholics the realities of hunger and poverty around the world." Bishop Albert Sanschagrin of Amos, Que., said the bishops hope to collect between \$700,000 and \$1,000,000 annually and it would go toward secular projects regardless of the recipients' religion. The fund may be raised by an annual collection in all churches or by other methods. A committee will be appointed to organize the program. The bishops said they hope to establish a secretariat to administer the assistance. Duplication with government and other aid programs would be avoided. The fund will also provide emergency relief for areas ravaged by disasters.

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
