Re: Closing due to bad weather

Questions have arisen about policies and procedures followed in closing the university for bad weather. For some years, we have followed the policy as outlined in the Faculty Handbook, which reads as follows:

The University considers that its work is at least as important as that of business and government. Consequently, the University is closed for bad weather when downtown businesses and provincial government offices are closed. News of such closing will be broadcast on radio.

It is sometimes necessary to cancel classes in off-campus courses even though regular classes have been held. These cancellations will be announced on radio.

Before this decision is announced, the Registrar or his designate checks with some or all of the following: weather bureau, snowplow dispatcher, RCMP, maintenance, security, Civil Service Commission, Unit Three School Board, a contact in Morell, a contact in Hymvale, and consults with the Director of Administration & Finance and the Director of Extension. If he then considers that the University should be closed, he so recommends to the President.

In order to avoid conflicting reports in the future, individual cancellations of regular courses should be channeled through the Registrar, and of Extension courses through the Director of Extension.

So that adequate notice may be given, every effort will be made to have notices of cancellations or delayed openings on the air by 7:30 a.m. Cancellation of evening classes will be aired about 5:00 p.m.
