VALUABLE DISCOVERY.—It is reported that large quantities of manganese have been found in a bog near Point Du Bute. It is said to be fifteen feet deep and of good quality.—Dorchester Spectator.

FUNERAL SERVICE.—The funeral service of the Rev. William Scott will be held in Zion Church on Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. The body will be interred in Marshfield Cemetery. Friends and acquaintances are requested to attend the service in the church.

WALSH SENTENCED.—In the case of John Walsh, tried at St. John for killing John Meahan, the jury returned a verdict of manslaughter and the prisoner was sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary. Walsh struck Meahan with a stone which he claimed to have thrown at a bottle.

CHILD BURNED ON A STOVE.—A Weymouth paper says: Ruth, the little daughter of Mr. Wallace Blackadar, met with rather a strange accident one day last week. While playing she fell, burning her arm on the stove, and the scar formed the letters R U B as plainly as though they had been printed.

A NOBLE RESPONSE.—A few Sundays ago Rev. Mr. Gandier, pastor of Fort Massey church, Halifax, asked his congregation for 10,000 to pay the addition which has recently been made to the church to be utilized for Sunday schools purposes. On Sunday week nearly \$5,000 was subscribed one gentleman giving \$1,000 of the amount. The \$5,000 has since been supplemented and the 10,000 will probably be forthcoming.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening. The teachers reports showed the enrolment to be 1441, with an average attendance of 1219. The highest percentage of attendance in Prince Street School was made in Miss Harris' room 97, Queen Square Mr. Bradley's 95, West Kent Miss Ashley's 93. The Board ordered that the schools close for the Christmas holidays on Friday, 24th inst., and re-open on Monday, 3rd prox.

A SUCCESSFUL EXPERIMENT.—As an experiment a seven mile branch railway operated by electricity was built last season for freight service through one of the best fruit districts in the neighborhood of Niagara. It has proved a great success. It has carried as many as 19 cars of fruit in one day and averaged 9 cars per day during August and September. This branch is used for a passenger service as well as freight. It connects with the New York Central. The rate for carrying peaches, the principal crop, is one cent per basket.

OWEN HAMIL'S DEATH.—A Shediac man who was in the city on Saturday told a Times representative that a good deal of suspicion exists among the people there as to the manner by which Owen Hamill came to his death on Nov. 28th at Point du Chene, notwithstanding the verdict of accidental death returned by the jury. He further says that there is some talk of directing the Attorney General's attention to the matter with a view to having a further investigation. Hamill, it will be remembered, was found in an old car used as a coal shed on the Point du Chene wharf with a bad mark on the side of his head which witnesses at the inquest gave as their opinion had been caused by his head coming in contact with an iron bar kept behind the door where he was found. Dr. Legere gave it as his opinion that the wound might have been caused either by a blow or his having fallen and his head coming in contact with the iron bar, and it would be sufficient to cause death.—Moncton Times.

OLIVER CROMWELL.

This colossal rebel was carefully and ably portrayed by Mr. Percy Pope, in the course of a two hours lecture delivered in St. Paul's Schoolroom last evening. Mr. Pope first gave a succinct account of the conditions in which Oliver Cromwell was promoted to the Protectorate as well the causes out of which those conditions grew, and then he depicted the great figure of the man who triumphed over king and parliament and who taught the world to fear the might of England. For this purpose he dwelt upon the collection of letters written by Cromwell to his wife, children and friends—setting forth his inner thoughts and feelings and motives. The lecture was longer than usual, but it was interesting throughout and bore the marks of a careful and conscientious study of the subject. Judge FitzGerald occupied the chair and conveyed the thanks of the meeting to the learned lecturer.

Miss Van Tassel charges the downfall of one young man to this custom, and she has made an appeal to the society women of Topeka to put away their wine decanters and assist in saving the young men from drunkard's graves. She said:

"I think it is just awful the way wine is given to young men by some of the society women of Topeka. One young man has been ruined by this practice and others are on the road to ruin. These society young women of this town do not object to the young men drinking liquor, and it is still more shocking to know that many of the young women drink liquor themselves."

Miss Van Tassel will carry her war into the churches and will appeal to the parents to throw the stuff into the gutters.
