THE average exportation of horses from Canada to the United States for some years past has been 22,000 head. A few years ago the average value per head of horses so exported was \$95, whereas last year it was \$140.

A WISCONSIN farmer, going down a hill with a load of hay, locked one of the wheels of the wagon. The friction of the wheel upon the ground struck a spark, which ignited the hay and started a fire that it required eleven men to extinguish.

We announce to-day the nuptials of Dr. Robins and Miss M. L. MacLennan, and unite with many friends in wishing them health, happiness and prosperity. Dr. Robins and his bride left this morning for a tour in Canada and the United States.

ODDFELLOWSHIP.—The festivities attending the session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge on the 20th inst., in Boston, Mass., promises to be gorgeous. It is estimated that over one hundred thousand Oddfellows will walk in procession, and fifty bands of music will participate.

The Rev. Adam Chambers presented his panorama of "Pilgrim's Progress" in St. James' Hall, last evening. The wonderful allegory ought, however treated, to be always interesting to a Christian people; and it is somewhat surprising that the audience was not larger. The Panorama will again be presented in St. Paul's schoolroom to-morrow evening.

THE exports of cattle and sheep from Montreal up to the end of July were 40,247 head—a decrease of 453 head from last year, an increase of 7,037 over 1884, of 7,870 over 1883, and of 29,514 over 1878. Exports of sheep to date were 43,386 head—an increase of 13,051 head over last year, of 9,011 over 1884, of 960 over 1883, a decrease of 384 from 1882 and 11,637 compared with 1880.

THE Summerside Pioneer says that on Monday evening last Mr. and Mrs. George Ackerman of that place celebrated their golden wedding, on which occasion a number of friends called and presented them with a purse containing \$70 in gold. A kindly worded and handsomely got-up address was also presented to the worthy couple. A very pleasant time was spent by those present—music and refreshments constituting the evening's programme.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning Mrs. N. Loughran, for keeping a disorderly house on Euston Street, was sentenced to three months imprisonment with hard

labor, and a girl named Lottie Welsh, for frequenting the same and being a common street walker, was sentenced to imprisonment for a like period. The sailor who stole the suit of clothes from Capt. McIsaac, was given a month's imprisonment, and one drunk was disposed of.

A New Watson-Deering Binder, belonging to Peter Doyle, Esq., Lot 7, was subjected to a very thorough test, on Mr. Doyle's farm, last Wednesday. The machine worked splendidly and did its work thoroughly. Not the slightest hitch occurred from the start to the finish. James Ramsay, Esq., Mr. Doyle's neighbor, who is 93 years of age, was so delighted with the work performed that he mounted the seat himself and seemed to manage the machine with as much ease and pride as he was wont to experience in commanding his favorite ship.

A friend informs us that in 1877, the first oats were marketed here on Sept. 10th; in '78, on Sept. 20th; in '79, Sept. 20; '80, on Sept. 30; '81, Sept. 6; '82, Sept. 4; '83, Aug. 20; '84, Sept. 11; '85, Aug. 26; '86, Aug. 24. These figures indicate that our harvests are gradually getting earlier.—Pioneer.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Fishing Schooner Captured. GEORGETOWN, Sept. 1. The American fishing schooner Highland Light was captured and taken in here to-day by the cruiser Houlette.

Aquatic.

LONDON, Aug. 31. The last of the preliminary races in the international sculling sweepstakes were rowed to-day. There were two heats, between Beach, of Australia, and Bubear, of England, and the other between Teemer and Matterson. Beach and Teemer were the winners. The weather was fine but the water somewhat lumpy. Beach led Bubear throughout the heat, and won as he pleased by a clear six lengths. The betting was 6 to 1, and Beach's time was 18m, 38s. Teemer was almost as fast a favorite for the second heat as Beach was for the first, 5 to 1 being offered on him. The men got off together and remained on a level during the first 200 yards. Matterson then began to forge ahead and soon led by a length when he crossed over and took Teemer's water, Teemer closed up and touched Matterson's boat thus winning the race on a foul. Teemer afterwards got clear of Matterson who stopped dead beaten. Teemer continued to the line finishing alone. Beach declares that he is wonderfully well and confident of beating Teemer in the final race to-morrow. Betting on the result is 7 to 4 on Beach.

Expelling the Refugees.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 31. Three leaders of the conspiracy against Prince Alexander, including the Treasurer of the Revolutionary Funds, have taken refuge in this city. The Government has decided to expell them and notified the refugees that they must leave. The conspirators thereupon appealed to the Russian legation for protection. Telegrams were passing between the legation and St. Petersburg during the whole of last night. Prince Alexander will arrive at Philippopolis to-morrow.

The Dominion Rifle Association.

OTTAWA, Aug. 31. In the rifle shooting in the manufacturer's match, the first prize was won by Capt. Sylvester, 88th; Capt. Harris, of the Halifax Artillery, won \$10. In the Rideau match, Capt. Hart, of St. John Rifles, won first prize with a score of 32. Corpl. Langstroth won \$10.

An Eruptive Geyser.

CINNABAR, MONT., Aug. 31. The Excelsior Geyser in Yellowstone Park, the most powerful geyser in the world, suddenly broke out on Friday, and continued to play for over twenty-four hours. The Excelsior has been quiet for over four years.

A Series of Ovatons.

TEENOVER, Aug. 31. Prince Alexander's journey here from Sistora, was a series of ovatons. The people, headed by priests, flocked to the different points of the route of procession and greeted the Prince with joyous shouts of welcome.

Movements of Sir Charles.

HALIFAX, Aug. 31. Sir Charles Tupper intended leaving here for Ottawa to-morrow, but left by special train this afternoon to visit his brother, Dr. Nathan Tupper, at Amherst, who is dying.
