The Supreme Court of Canada ruled Tuesday that under the British North America Act — this country's constitution — one government cannot delegate to another a power assigned by the act. If the Privy Council upheld Canada's court decision, the Nova Scotia Government would in all probability fight for an amendment of the constitution, the Premier said.

With reference to a Canadian Press despatch from Ottawa appearing in yesterday's issue regarding the prospects for potatoes, Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, states that the situation is at present so confused that no person can estimate what the final marketing position may be. Any hope that conditions may improve, he states, is only conjecture at present and does not help the situation at the moment. The potato market is now in a deplorable weak condition and it looks as if extraordinary measures must be taken to improve it.
