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Storm Damages Apple Crop In Ontario

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP) — Strong northwest winds, gusting at times at 60 miles an hour, accompanied by sweeping rain caused considerable damage to the apple crop and left fishermen in the Leamington area with their fingers crossed.

The winds knocked down hundreds of bushels of apples about ready to harvest and caught fishermen with their nets in Lake Erie. Damage to fishing gear will not be known until the nets are pulled.

With the apple crop, the damage was apparent Tuesday afternoon and is likely to run high. Apple growers had just started to pick McIntoshes. That variety as well as Jonathans and Delicious took a beating.

France Has No Plan To Sell Islands Off Nfld.

OTTAWA (CP)—France has no intention of selling the islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon, off the south coast of Newfoundland.

Edgar Faure, finance minister of France, told a press conference Tuesday that the two islands have been French territory for many years. He is convinced his country would not consider selling them.

The question of the future of the islands was raised by a reporter who noted a newspaper report that the islands' residents are moving to oust their governor, I. Davier, appointed by the French colonial office.

The report said residents are protesting certain taxes imposed by the governor.

Mr. Faure said he could give no explanation of the events in the islands.

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To Consider Ban On Indian Liquor

CAUGHNAWAGA, Que. (CP) — The ban on the sale of liquor to Indians in most provinces is among topics to be discussed at a meeting here of the North American Indian Brotherhood.

The three-day annual meeting opened Tuesday on this reservation on the outskirts of Montreal. Approximately 75 delegates represent tribes from various part of Canada.

Joseph Delisle, a vice-president of the brotherhood, said the liquor question came up at other conventions but no vote had been taken. He did not indicate what action he expects the meeting to take.

Canadian Ship Rescues Korean

OTTAWA, (CP)—Steaming out on her first patrol of her third tour of duty in Korean waters, HMCS Iroquois recently spotted an "object" in the water.

On close inspection, it turned out to be a raft with a Korean fisherman clinging to it. His junk had foundered in a storm the previous night. He was the sole survivor.

Geologists' Bodies Are Recovered

OTTAWA, (CP)—Bodies of two geology students drowned in a remote Labrador lake have been recovered, officials of the geological survey of Canada said Saturday.

The victims were J. E. Howell, about 25, of Lambeth, Ont., and William Zolostki, 22, of Toronto. Howell's widow lives in Madison, Wis.

The two disappeared Sept. 10 and their overturned canoe was found in an unnamed lake. Survey officials said it was possible the canoe was blown offshore and tipped over by the wind.

The lake is some 300 miles north of Sept. 11es, Que., on the north shore of the St. Lawrence river and about 12 miles from the new Menhok power dam.
