**Memorial Unveiling Features Program At Alberton On Remembrance Day**

Remembrance Day at Alberton was observed with impressive ceremonies which centered about the unveiling of a war memorial in honor of those who made the supreme sacrifice during two world wars.

The beautiful monument, a Rock of Ages Barre granite slab mounted on a granite base and having an overall height of about eight feet, has a scene of the setting sun depicting the words of remembrance. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them. Beneath it is the inscription, "Erected by the Alberton branch of the Canadian Legion to the glory of God and in everlasting memory of our fallen comrades." Then appear the names.

The parade, which formed up at the Masonic Hall proceeded west on Poplar Street, thence north on Main and west on Church to the Legion grounds, and returned via Church and Central Streets to the place of formation. Burke's pipe band; Legion color party; parade marshal Herbert Leavitt; provincial president E. Foch McDonald, M.M.; Alberton branch president, comrade J. R. Rochford; veterans of World Wars I and II; Boy Scout color party; Boy Scouts; Wolf Cubs, school children.

During the entire unveiling ceremony two Boy Scouts in full uniform stood at each side of the monument. Following "O Canada" introductory remarks by Comrade J. R. Rochford, president of Alberton branch, and a prayer of invocation by Rev. George Gillen, the monument was unveiled by provincial president E. Foch McDonald, M.M., and the prayer of dedication offered by Legion chaplain J. R. McMahon. The singing of "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" was led by a massed choir with Mr. John Leuty as organist.

Mayor Hilton Barbour expressed pride in the beautiful monument and on behalf of the town and surrounding districts voiced sincere thanks to members of Alberton branch of the Canadian Legion who had assumed the entire responsibility of erecting it.

**PRINCIPAL SPEAKER**

Provincial chaplain T. E. McNutt was the principal speaker. He reminded his hearers that at all times and especially on Remembrance Day "we should remember before God those who fell and we should remember the disabled, the widows and orphans of the one hundred thousand Canadians and nearly two million men and women of the Empire who fell, I can do no better," he said, "than quote in part the inscription on the grave of the unknown warrior in Westminster Abbey at the heart of our Commonwealth and Empire. They gave the most that man can give - life itself for God, for King and Country, for loved ones, for the sacred cause of justice."

The Last Post sounded by Bugler William Chaisson with lowering of the colors, was followed by two minutes silence and Reveille with raising again of the colors.

Then the laying of wreaths took place. For the Provincial Government by J. W. Don Campbell, M.L.A. of Alberton, Mayor H. E. Barbour; Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion, E. Foch McDonald; Alberton Legion branch, Comrade R. M. Dunn World War I names were read by Rev. Murray Gardner and those of World War II by M. E. Callaghan in place of Rev. W. E. Monaghan

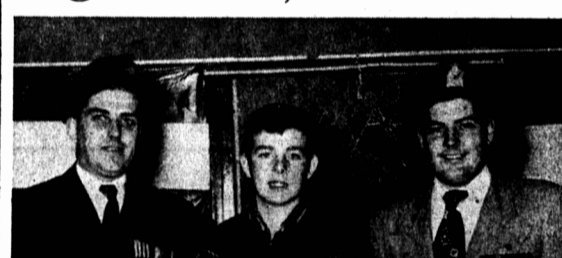
Mr. Ben Sonier, president of the branch, also spoke briefly.

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**Dr. Jas. Higgins Guest Speaker At Legion Dinner**

Dr. James Higgins of Charlottetown was guest speaker at the Kensington Legion Remembrance Day banquet in Malpeque hall last evening.

In his talk on citizenship, Dr. Higgins reviewed the evolution of administration from the early days of Canadian history to the present complex systems of government at various levels.

The meeting was presided over by W. L. Miller, and Archie Johnston was toast master.

The toast to the armed forces and the Canadian Legion was responded to by H. L. Howard, while the toast to the ladies was responded to by Mrs. Archie Johnston.

About 110 men and women attended the banquet. The membership of the Kensington Legion includes veterans from Kensington and all surrounding districts.

The Remembrance Day program in the morning included a church parade of Legion members, Boy Scouts and Cubs to the Presbyterian and Roman Catholic Churches.

At 10:45 the parade moved to the War Memorial for the laying of wreaths and observance of the silence.

The chimes of the United Church were played during parts of the program.

At 2 p.m. the Legion members attended a parade, short service, laying of a wreath at Malpeque, and the same program was carried out at 3 p.m. at the Geddie Memorial.

**Observe Remembrance Day In Summerside Yesterday**

Remembrance Day was solemnly and sincerely observed in Summerside yesterday when veterans of two world wars and naval and air force personnel formed a hollow square at the Memorial Square Cenotaph, flanked by various other military and civilian organizations and paid tribute to the memory of our fallen.

The tolling of the Trinity United Church chimes from 10:55 to 10:58 provided a solemn background for the large gathering which had assembled to join in the memorial service, presided over by Mr. F. J. McNell, president of the No. 5 Branch of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L.

After two minutes silence was observed from 11:00 to 11:02 and a short poem read by Mr. McNell, the firing party from "C" Squadron, 17 Recce Regiment fired three volleys, which was followed by the Last Post and Reveille sounded by bugler Albert C. Gallant. The Reformed led by Walter Bernard and marched to the Soldiers Monument for the laying of wreaths and minutes silence. The parade then returned via Church Street to the Legion Hall where after being dismissed a large number motored to Alberton to attend the War Memorial unveiling there.

**Plaque Unveiled During Remembrance Day Services Yesterday In O'Leary**

Impressive services in front of the war memorial and in the Verdun Theatre marked the observance of Remembrance Day in O'Leary yesterday. At the war memorial in the presence of a large number of the residents of O'Leary and vicinity and members of the Legion, the time-honored ceremonies of Remembrance Day were carried out with dignity and solemnity. The highlight of these was the unveiling of a plaque on the cenotaph on which is inscribed the names of the honored dead in both world wars.

14 of these paid the supreme sacrifice in World War one and 27 in World War Two.

The unveiling was performed by Major John S. Wright of Summerside who complimented the members of the O'Leary Branch (No. 2) for the manner in which all the details had been carried out.

At the conclusion of the ceremonies at the monument, members of the Legion, Boy Scouts and Girl Guides and residents gathered at the Verdun Theatre where Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P. was the principal speaker.

Expressing his congratulations to all those who were responsible for the splendid observance of the day Mr. MacNaught said that we now have a generation many of which retain no memories of the First World War and many whose memories of the Second World War are dim. In time, he went on, such observances of Remembrance Day as was seen here today will be carried out by those who will have no recollections at all of the tragic two world wars.

"We must make sure then" he said "that the sacrifices of those valiant men shall not have been in vain."

Brief addresses were also delivered by Dr. L. G. Dewar, W. Forrest Phillips, Major John S. Wright, Rev. Mr. Wagner, Mr. Alton Rayner. The speakers were introduced by Comrade Sterling Barbour, president of the branch.

A parade composed of flag bearers, clergy, Legion members, wreath bearers, and children and teachers from Borden, Carleton and Cape Traverse schools, formed on the Borden school grounds and marched to the Legion Home where a Remembrance Day program was conducted, which included the silence, remarks by Mayor Willard Leard and by the vice-president of the branch, the laying of wreaths, the presentation of the artificial limb to Richard Kelly and the distribution of chocolate bars and apples to the school children.

In his remarks Mayor Leard paid tribute to the memory of those who had given their lives in defence of democracy and said that he felt assured that all of the Borden citizens were proud of the Legion members and the work which they are doing. He expressed a special word of welcome to all those from neighbouring districts who were in attendance at the remembrance program.
