Freight Rate Hearing

In present hearings the Board of Transport Commissioners is collecting evidence on two matters—those of freight rate equalization and the level crossing protection problem.

The latter was the subject of a resolution at the annual C.F.A. meeting and the National office is now preparing a Brief on this question. Up to the present time the Dominion Government has granted one million dollars year-wise for the purpose of improving railway crossings and provinces, municipalities and the railways have supplemented this amount by varying percentages. It is likely that a strong recommendation will be made for an increase in the amount provided by Dominion authorities in order that safety crossings will be provided more rapidly.

County Meetings

At the end of June, semi-annual county meetings will be held in various counties and get the farmers' views and suggestions on proposed future problems.

It is likely that an attempt will be made to get the reaction of the growers to the possibility of using the Dominion Agricultural Market Board in respect to their produce, in which farm owners are still interested as a means of artificial inflation, artificial insurance, the Accident Insurance Meetings of the County Boards will be held to plan the county meetings and due notice will be given through the press.

Grass Silage

Over a long time is rapidly becoming when grasses and covers will be ready for storage in the various types of structures available.

To all those interested in this method of saving feed we recommend study of this week's Agricultural News which appeared in the press on Wednesday. This article contains much information valuable alike both to the beginner and the more experienced.

To those planning an early start we would suggest the desirability of storing the grasses and making them first and leaving the straw clover until such time as there is a high percentage of bloom.

N. B. Visitors

During the week of June 22 a group of New Brunswick farmers will visit the Province with the intention of inspecting livestock farms, co-operative development and points of historic interest.

Tours such as these are a pleasant interlude in the daily routine of farm life but also have definite educational value and serve to stimulate the ambition of those involved for progress and improvement. The New Brunswick visitors will be very welcome and will be looked after by the Travel Bureau, the Department of Agriculture and the Federation.

Education Conference

Meeting in Antigonish this week, workers in the field of Adult Education held the Atlantic Regional Conference of the Canadian Association for Adult Education—an affair which takes place every two years.

Delegates from Prince Edward

Island, representing the Departments of Education, Agriculture, the Adult Education Division, the Women's Institutes, the Farm Forums, and the Federation, all took part in the discussions and benefited by the ideas and inspiration of those present from other provinces.

The Co-operative Agricultural Marketing Act

For some years the Dominion Government has had available for the use of organized agricultural groups a plan which in certain instances considerable merit. Briefly, the Dominion may, under this Act, enter into an agreement with the organized producers of any agricultural product for the marketing thereof.

Under the Act authority is given to make an initial payment on the product up to 80 per cent of the average price for the previous three crop years. Should the market price fall below the agreed upon initial payment, the deficit, plus certain handling charges come out of the Dominion Treasury; should the market be above the initial payment the difference goes into a pool and at the end of the period for which the pool has operated the balance is paid to the producers.

The plan insures that all farmers will get the same price for the same grade of a commodity and will not be under the necessity of attempting to outguess the market.

For example, if potatoes had been under the plan for the last year no one would have gotten as high as \$3.25 or as low as 30 cents—an average figure somewhere between would have resulted.
