Garden Party For Governor-General's Visit On Thursday

During his visit here next week, His Excellency the Right Honourable Vincent Massey will be the guest of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. T. W. L. Prowse at Government House.

For the garden party which will be held in honour of the Governor General at Government House, gentlemen will be correct in dark business suits, while the correct dress for ladies is afternoon dress, hat and gloves.

On presentation to His Excellency it is customary for ladies to curtsy, while gentlemen bow. On being presented ladies take the Governor General's hand and at the same time, curtsy. Gentlemen take the hand and bow over it.

The first move in making the curtsy is to swing the right foot behind, moving the right foot toward the left until it is directly behind the left foot. Bend both knees slowly. It is not necessary to curtsy deeply—a graceful bob of about six inches is all that is required. As the lady bends her knees, she should lower her eyes. It is improper to look His Excellency full in the eyes at this stage of the curtsy.

The lady now arises from this position a little more quietly. She straightens up it is proper to look His Excellency straight in the eye, and acknowledge any greetings he may offer. As soon as the lady is upright, she returns the right foot to the normal position. This ends the curtsy.

As for the male bow, this should not be from the waist. Gentleman should simply incline the head forward slowly until the chin is just above the knot of the tie. Gentlemen should stand at attention when bowing, bend the head forward slowly, return the head to its normal position a little more quickly, and then look the Governor General in the eye.

It is not proper to initiate a conversation with His Excellency unless first spoken to by him. If spoken to by the Governor General one should address him as "Your Excellency" and after that simply say "Sir".

TRUE INSPIRATION

The poet Shelley has left us two poems which seem to contradict but really supplement each other. One day he read a newspaper account of the discovery of the fragments of a huge statue in the Egyptian desert. Two large legs of stone were standing in the sand, and nearby the trunk and head were found, the face still bearing "the frown and wrinkled lip, and sneer of cold command." The inscription on the statue reads, "I am Ozymandias, King of Kings." The idea a king, once so proud in his power, and now remembered only by a shattered statue in the desert sands impressed the poet so deeply with the vanity of human achievement that he wrote a sonnet entitled "Ozymandias" which has given his feelings a form more enduring than the sculptor's carving in stone.

The other poem begins: "Music, when soft voices die, Vibrates in the memory; Odours, when sweet violets sicken, Live within the sense they quicken."

Through their effect on the spirit of man the changing becomes the changeless. Still more, it becomes an inspiration which rekindles the sacred fire in soul after soul. Compared with the carven statue the violet and the song seem only momentary, but they perpetuate themselves indefinitely through the souls whom they renew.

At the moment we are enjoying the foliage of midsummer. The luxuriance of the leaves is often overpowering. But soon the yellow will begin to appear among the green showing that the function of the leaves is fulfilled and that there is nothing for them but to fade and fall. Yet every leaf has made its contribution to the tree and through it to the forests of the future.

So it is with men. King David could exclaim: "There is but a step between me and death!" but his influence today is wider and deeper than ever before.

Lord Byron could write: "My days are in the yellow leaf," but his poetry thrills the generations. So it is with all who appeal to the spirits of men.

It is one thing to teach; it is a far greater thing to inspire. A teacher's talent is in itself a priceless worth; not only does he store the minds of his pupils with truth but he also develops the minds that he informs. Then there are some teachers who fire the imagination of the student. The truth means so much to them that they inspire youth with their own sense of its value and move them to devote their lives to its advocacy.

It is really love's overplus which makes the contribution endure. In the first place, it is necessary that the teaching itself, as a foundation-stone, be "well and truly laid." The old rhyme, "I care not what Mark Hopkins taught, though his Latin were poor and his Greek were nought," misrepresents the situation; no teacher can command his pupils' respect unless he is a master of his subject. But that granted, it is personality that he puts into his teaching that makes his contribution abiding.

Our college principal in the long ago was a profound theologian. He knew what he believed, and he taught with such clearness and force that we could never forget what he gave us. It laid the foundation for all subsequent study. But what moved us to the depths of our being was the way in which he brought his great principles to bear on conditions in his city and province. He saw vividly what those principles implied and he never shrank from their application. He knew that he had risked his life in their defense, and that no cause in which he believed would ever lack a champion. He sent us out with a passion to apply truth to life. After all the years, the drive of his convictions is behind us still. Long since he passed into the unseen, but his spirit can never die.

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Bishop's Hospital Building Fund Meetings Held

Instruction meetings were held last evening for the St. Dunstan Basilica and Holy Redeemer Parish committees of the \$300,000 Bishop's Hospital Building Fund. The committees for the Basilica met in the Holy Name Hall at 7.30 p.m. while the members of the committee for the Holy Redeemer Parish met in the Holy Redeemer Community Centre at the same hour.

The meetings attended by all campaign workers, included all vice-chairmen, team captains and team workers. Final solicitation instruction were given to the volunteers and work-kits containing the assigned pledge cards, instruction folder and report envelopes distributed.

His Excellency, the Most Reverend James Boyle, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown, attended both meetings and addressed the assembled campaign workers.

The meetings conclude the preparatory phase of the campaign to raise funds to help pay for the modernization and construction program at the Charlottetown Hospital. The more than 2,200 volunteer campaign workers in the diocesan-wide appeal will begin their solicitation calls this Sunday afternoon following the campaign opening ceremonies which will be held in St. Dunstan's Basilica at 3:15 p.m.
