Fowl were very scarce at 55 to 60 cents per pair. H-y sold at 50 to 60 cents per hundred. Oats were moving very slowly at 33 cents per bushel. Other articles sold at usual prices.

Wrecked Seamen.

Dreadful Suffering and Death.

HALIFAX, March 23.

The crew of the bark Sylvan, wrecked off Yarmouth, N. S., had a terrible experience in getting to land. They struck on Trinity Ledge at nine o'clock on Sunday evening. The vessel pounded heavily and drifted off. They managed to get out a life boat. All hands, numbering sixteen, got into her and managed to keep her head to sea till daylight. At midnight they found themselves close on Cranberry Head, where a tremendous sea was breaking. But they held off till daylight. Then, as a last resort, they let their boat drift ashore and jumped for their lives. Eleven of them got to land in an exhausted condition, and all more or less frost-bitten. Five were drowned. The names of the drowned are: Charles Pesock (German), who had a wife in Liverpool; William Jones, of Liverpool; Charles Gast (German); Peter Torrin, (Norwegian); George Saunders, Liverpool. The bodies of Pesock and Saunders have been washed ashore.

Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, March 23.

In the House of Commons, Mr. L. H. Davies was granted a motion for returns of correspondence, telegrams, papers, reports, etc., relating to the intended dismissal of a number of Intercolonial Railway employees at Moncton, Halifax and other places.

In the Senate Hon. Mr. Boulton, of Manitoba, commenced to discuss the Newfoundland matter on a simple interrogation, but was so badgered by Kaulbach and Howland that he eventually subsided and will introduce a motion on the subject.

Another Fire in St. John.

ST. JOHN, March 22.

Yesterday Lloyds bonded warehouse, in which were stored paints, oils, etc., took fire. The fire was got under control, but the loss on goods owned by W. H. Thorne & Co., was about \$10,000; insurance on goods \$3,400.

The house of a man named Leahy was burned here last night. Five of his children perished in the flames.

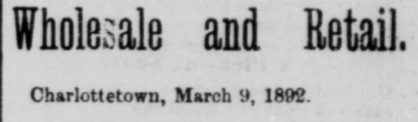
