ALL GOODS marked down to rock bottom prices at the Lazar this evening.

THE ROLLER RINK - The Band of the 82nd Regt. will be at the Rink to-night with a first class programme.

DR. ALEXANDER, Professor of English Literature in Dalhousie College, paid his old friends in Charlottetown a visit on Saturday, and left for Halifax this morning.

A DAY and festive New York book-keeper, named Fisher, is the latest recruit for the American colony in Canada. He brings with him strong recommendations in the shape of upwards of \$40,000 of his employer's money.

REV. JOSEPH COOK'S first lecture (Wednesday, 4th November) will be "Seven Modern Wonders of the World," and on Thursday evening, 5th November, "Does Death End All?" The selections are grand, the universal verdict being that those two discourses are his great masterpieces.

A NOVEL CREMATION - Alfred Cobb, aged 77 years, of East Deerfield, Mississippi, who lies at the point of death, has requested that when he dies his body be taken to his tobacco barn and there kept for three days, and then taken to a hill near the house, saturated with kerosene oil, and burned.

The large congregations who attend the Rev. gentleman's services testify to his popularity and ability.

Mrs. DULLA, who is undergoing the remarkable fast at Syracuse, N. Y., completed her 60th day without food on Thursday. In the morning she swallowed half a teaspoon of liquor. Among the precautions taken to obtain a faultless leaf for the 'Myrtle Navy' is to ascertain carefully the methods which every farmer adopts with his crops in the sections of Virginia where the 'Myrtle Navy' is grown.

KANSAS papers give particulars of the accidental death last month, at the age of thirty, of William Murdoch Mellish, only son of Mr. William Mellish, formerly of Pownal, now of Hillsboro, N. B. We are sure that Mr. and Mrs. Mellish's many friends on this Island will deeply sympathize with them in the loss of their son, as well as with the bereaved young widow. The deceased and his brother-in-law, Dr. J. S. Giddings, were about starting to visit a patient living some miles distant. As the road lay through a wood they hoped to shoot some game, and put their guns in the bottom of the wagon. Mr. Mellish, while standing in the rear, took hold of the muzzle of one of the guns to move it, causing the discharge. His right arm was so shattered that Dr. Giddings and three other physicians decided to amputate it. Mr. Mellish rallied for a short time after the operation, but in spite of every effort he died in eight hours after the accident. The deceased was a young man of energy, ability and high promise, and was a general favorite. Being a Master Mason, and Senior Warden of his lodge, the Masons in great number, and also the Knights of Pythias, walked at his funeral.

THE GOSPEL ARMY. - Since the arrival of this little band of Christian workers, the Assembly of Music has been nightly crowded and the excitement is still kept up. Their mode of work may be novel but it is nevertheless effective. The Gospel Army originated in St. John, N. B., last spring. Its aim is to reach not only the unconverted but also those who take no active interest in the churches. The meetings are held at such hours as not to interfere with the different churches. They are held in Public Halls, so as to have as wide an audience as possible, and also that any Christian may have perfect liberty and freedom to take part in the services, and because many will come who will not attend the churches. Converts are always recommended to join the church of their own choice. This Army differs from the Salvation Army in that the Salvation Army organize permanently and are separate and distinct from the churches, and hold services at the same hour as the churches. While adopting many of the methods of the Salvation Army, they omit the use of drums and flags and other of the more prominent features. The Charlottetown detachment is composed of Capt. J. H. Collins, Miss Bartlett and Mrs. Weeks. Before starting from the Hall for the Market Square they hold a short prayer meeting, sometimes singing on their knees this or similar Army Hymns - "I will go Lord, I will go Lord, I will go where you want me to go." Then starting off with burning torches and singing some suitable marching Hymn, they come to Market Square where they are always surrounded by a large crowd. Attractive Hymns are sang and invitations given to come to the Hall. The meetings are thereby always filled with many who come from curiosity, and many of them receive good impressions. So far, there have been quite a number of converts. It is thought by some that because clergymen do not take part that they are opposed to the Army and its methods; but this is not so. The Army have the prayers of all the churches, and the work appears to go on more successfully in the hands of members of the Army and laymen. The best of order is preserved at these meetings, although so overcrowded; for this decorum much credit is due to the vigilance of our police. The Army have been greatly aided in their work by the cheerful and active assistance of Mr. W. T. Pilmore. We wish them every success.

McLeod, of Dunstaffnage, of the third year class, and Messrs. Gordon Laird, of Charlottetown, and John Fraser, of Alberton, of the first year class. The remainder of Prince Edward Island's contingent - six or more in number - to Dalhousie College, will leave early next week to rejoin their classes. We bespeak for them the traditional success of P. E. Islanders abroad.

SELICK'S GREAT LIVE ANIMAL SHOW is now on exhibition on the Market Square, and consists of the Great Indian War Horse, the same as the celebrated Half-breed Rebel Leader rode during the Northwest Rebellion. He has mane enough for four common horses, which shows the durability of the animal. Also a live Moose, the finest ever exhibited in North America; and the Great King Black Labrador Bear, the Baby Bear, a Porcupine and four choice Hunting Dogs. As this exhibition closes here to-morrow evening, at 9 o'clock, do not miss this opportunity of seeing it. A large number of respectable ladies and gentlemen have already visited it, and pronounce it well worth seeing. Mr. Sellick is a native of this Island, but has spent the greater part of his life in the great North American forests, hunting and trapping. Having now returned to his native country with this large collection of wild animals, etc., which he will exhibit in all principal parts of the Island. It, pd.

REFERRING to the deaths of last year in the Presbyterian Church of the Province, Moderator McLean, at the meeting of Synod, said: "Rev. Mr. Seligewick, whose death had been referred to, was a neighbor of his, and was his friend and counsellor for twenty-one years. His influence was felt as that of the morning sun; his honesty, his kindness, his love for truth, his fervency, gave him a wonderful power, which he used for the service of his Master. He was called away suddenly, in answer to his prayers that he might not be a trouble to his friends in his declining years. Rev. Mr. Munro, well known in P. E. Island, has been carried away at a ripe old age. Both of these honored men have left behind them sons in the ministry. The venerable Mr. Wilson has also passed away. He was highly spoken of in Cape Breton. Rev. Chas. Fraser was also called away suddenly. While these honored servants have been removed, we are thankful to be here to welcome the young men who have been recently ordained, and who give promise of great usefulness."

A LECTURER FROM PALESTINE - The Rev. G. Howie, a native of Syria and a graduate of Edinburgh, arrived in Halifax on the 29th April last, and at once commenced a course of lectures upon the threefold subject, viz: Protestant Missions in the East; the state of Temperance there; Bible lands - its peoples, their customs, habits, dress, buildings. Acc. their arrival in Charlottetown on Saturday last and occupied the pulpits of St. James and Zion churches, and on Thursday in St. James' Church. Sometimes he appears in plain Eastern costume and always endeavors to explain and illustrate certain texts of Scripture by means of his lectures. On the last two Sundays of October he is expected to preach in Summerside Presbyterian Church, and we understand that he will be pleased to accept invitations to lecture in any part of the Island, on the subjects above referred to. His terms are not only easy but drastic. His letters may be addressed to Summerside or to St. James' Mans, Charlottetown. Possibly Mr. Howie may remain on the Island to the middle or end of December.

Suicide at Bunbury, Lot 48.

A MELANCHOLY suicide occurred at Bunbury, Lot 48, on Saturday night. A young man eighteen years of age named Solomon Hamm, hung himself in one of the out-buildings on the farm. The deceased had been weakened for a number of years. Lately he became unusually depressed in spirits on account of his mother's death and the severe illness of his sister and brother, both of whom are suffering from fever. On Saturday night he was missed from the house. His sister went to look for him but failed to find him in the barn. Yesterday morning his sister went to Mr. J. F. Baker's house and enquired for her brother. Alex. McInnis who was there went with her and searched the out-buildings on the Hamm farm. In a dark room off the stable they found the unfortunate young man hanging, by a horse-reins to the beams, cold and dead. He was cut down promptly. Dr. McLeod was sent for. An inquest was held in view of the body and a verdict returned according to the above facts. The family have the sympathy of the community in their sad bereavement.
