Precaution Advisable.

SMALLPOX is spreading in some sections of Quebec and New Brunswick. The Summerside Board of Health has ordered that a medical man board the steamer from Montreal each trip for the purpose of seeing that everything is all right.

The existing quarantine regulations provide that each vessel arriving from a foreign port must be inspected by the quarantine officer before either passengers or freight are landed, and vessels from any Canadian port where a contagious disease exists, must be provided with a clean bill of health, which is taken up by the Custom House officer who boards the ship as soon as she is moored.

These are very good regulations. But they are hardly sweeping enough for the present occasion. The quarantine officer should board every steamer or craft coming from a port where smallpox exists, and make a thorough examination before allowing anyone to come ashore or any of the freight to be landed.

It is not every captain who can diagnose a case of smallpox. Besides, the preliminary symptoms of smallpox are similar to the symptoms of a good many other diseases of a much less dangerous character.

But what about vaccination? It is not necessary that those who were successfully operated upon at the time of the late epidemic should be vaccinated now. But those who were not vaccinated then, as well as children born since, should be attended to at once.
