

**Radio Corp.  
Sets Record**

NEW YORK (AP) — Radio Corp. of America has reported it will have record sales and earnings for 1964 and expects to set new records in 1965.

In a year-end statement David Sarnoff, RCA chairman, said the company's earnings for 1964 will be more than \$80,000,000, or about \$1.50 a share, compared to last year's \$66,033,000, or \$1.20 a share.

In addition the company had a non-recurring profit of \$11,870,000, or 22 cents a share, from the sale of Whirlpool Corp. and from a tax refund. Sales will total about \$1,200,000,000 in 1964, said Sarnoff, compared to \$1,179,000,000 last year.

Sarnoff said RCA has contracts totalling more than \$105,000,000 for projects relating to the manned moon landing.

Sarnoff predicted that 1965 will produce a 15-per-cent gain in business for the electronics industry.

Sales of color television sets in the U.S. next year should top 2,000,000, he said, compared with 1,300,000 in 1964.

**Grain Sales  
Set Record  
For Canada**

WINNIPEG (CP) — Canada exported a record 61,900,000 bushels of wheat, oats, barley, rye and flaxseed during the 1963-64 crop year, the Board of Grain Commissioners reports in its annual review.

The movement represented an increase of a third of 90,000,000 bushels above the previous high of 53,900,000 bushels recorded in 1952-53 and is more than double the long-term 30-year average figure of 29,300,000 bushels.

Exports included a record 53,700,000 bushels of wheat, far above the old record of 34,000,000 set in 1926-29. Shipments of the other grains were well below records.

Wheat flour exports totalled 84,400,000 bushels, highest in 30 years, but below the record 1946-47 figure of 79,500,000.

Unrepresented shipments to the United Kingdom of 212,200,000 bushels represented some 40 per cent of the 1963-64 wheat clearance.

Wheat clearances to European Communist nations comprised 16.5 per cent of the 1963-44 shipments. Commonwealth nations took 16.5 per cent while countries of the European Common Market were the destination for 12-per-cent. Japan took 49,200,000 bushels.

**Galvanized  
Steel Sheets  
Prices Higher**

NEW YORK (AP) — Two more major producers have raised the price of galvanized steel sheets, bringing the number so far to six.

Mark-ups of \$4 a ton—some, where between two and three per cent—were announced by National Steel Corp and Armaco Steel Corp., both ranking among the six largest steel companies.

Rehlehem Steel Corp., the No. 2 firm, said it was studying the situation.

Galvanized sheets account for about five per cent of over-all steel mill products. They are heavily used in the automobile, household appliance and construction industries.

The price increase was regarded as a potentially significant spread of selective hikes which, if they followed a 1963 pattern, ultimately might extend to three-fourths or more of the market.

The galvanized mark-up was initiated a week ago by Inland Steel Co. Joining in later were U.S. Steel Corp., Republic Steel Corp. and Granite City Steel Co.

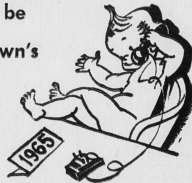
