The Hop Bitters Regatta

ROSS EASILY WINS FIRST HEAT.

Special despatch to Examiner.

LONDON, Nov. 15. In the first heat of the Hop Bitters Race to-day, in which Wallace Ross, Riley, Feeley, of Barrow-on-Furness, and Largen, of Wandsworth, rowed, Ross came in first an easy victor. Hanlan has decided not to row in these races.

EUROPEAN.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.

A London despatch says that at a Cabinet meeting on Monday the Irish Land question was discussed at considerable length. Two schemes for settling it were suggested—one based on the idea of giving the tenants greater security in their occupation as tenants of land, and the other, based on the idea of authorizing tenants to buy out their landlords on arbitration, as to price taking into account the rents paid. Capitalists, it is understood, favor the latter plan.

DUBLIN, Nov. 16.

The forty tenants on the Lough Mask estate have issued an address calling on all Irishmen, regardless of party, for assistance in money to enable them to go to the residence of Lord Erne. Many northern tenant farmers have already approved the project. Ten members of the Land League will accompany the tenants to Lord Erne's. If the expedition proves unsuccessful, the tenants intend to hold meetings in the northern counties and appeal to the northern tenants.

LONDON, Nov. 16.

A despatch from Brussels says there is good reason to believe that eight thousand rifles were shipped recently in some steamers at several Italian ports for Ireland, and that rifles were purchased in Switzerland by some Irishmen who had come from the United States.

LOUGH MASK CAMP, Nov. 14.

There was unusual stir in the camp last night when the constabulary brought a rumor that 1,200 men were going to make an attack. The report turned out to be baseless, but the usual precautions were taken. Sentries were stationed along the outskirts of the demesne, passwords were issued, and the little army prepared to turn out at the first note of alarm. Another company was sent to the camp to-day by way of reinforcement, but it seems that there was not the slightest need for alarm, as the country is patrolled by constabulary for miles around, while the force is on the alert everywhere, and the slightest gathering would instantly be known. A long train of army stores arrived this afternoon from Clarendon, under the escort of cavalry, infantry and constabulary. The scene in camp to-day was very interesting. The volunteers are quartered mostly in barns, where kitchens and sleeping accommodation had been fitted up. Here I found some men cleaning their revolvers, others reading newspapers or writing, while about a dozen were threshing corn or walking over to an ivy-covered, ruined castle within the demesne, whose ancient battlements have not for centuries witnessed such a martial scene. I discovered two great fires rearing around the volunteers and constabulary, who were trying to keep themselves warm, and were making the walls echo with their laughter. The entire scene at Capt. Boycott's farm is so strange that it is impossible to cease wondering at it. It is half serious, half ridiculous, and wholly interesting. It represents one of the most remarkable events in the history of Ireland. During the coming week there will probably be only a repetition of the scenes which I have already described. The report that a woman had been "carded" for selling food to one of the relief party turns out to be wholly false.

LONDON, Nov. 15.

The Observer has reason to believe that the Ministry do not contemplate any immediate exceptional measure for the preservation of peace in Ireland, but intend to defer action until the meeting of Parliament, which may be expected early in January. The Pall Mall Gazette on Saturday evening said the talk that Parliament will be summoned early in January probably has good foundation. Under ordinary circumstances Parliament would not meet until February.

LONDON, Nov. 16.

The Times says the Queen will hold a council at Windsor Palace on Saturday, when Parliament will be formally prorogued from 24th Nov., to a later date. It is rumored £500,000 more gold is to be sent to New York this week.

LONDON, Nov. 16.

Last evening in Glasgow the students who elected John Bright rector of the University, celebrated their victory by a torch light procession. The Conservatives took umbrage at this display and interfered with the lines at several points. This occasioned many violent encounters, but there is no wound of any person being seriously wounded.

PARIS, Nov. 16.

The Archbishop of Paris has written to the members of the dispersed religious orders, counseling them in their persecution, and enjoining patience and resignation.
