

Local and Other Items.

The market to-day was very well attended. Prices the same as on Friday.

ONE common drunk disposed of by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon.

HENRY LAWSON, Esq., Editor of the *Patriot*, arrived from Ottawa on Saturday last.

MR. PERCY POPE, son of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, arrived from Ottawa yesterday.

THE Grand Worthy Patriarch's Address, at the late session of the Grand Division will appear to-morrow.

THE S.S. "Prince Edward" Capt. Fraser, passed through Canso at one o'clock, p. m., due here to-morrow morning.

THE steamer *St. Lawrence* left for Pictou to-day, and the *Princess of Wales* left for Point du Chene. The latter is now off Angustine Cove.

THE Brig "Hildred," Capt. Callaghan, to Peake Bros. & Co., arrived from Liverpool this afternoon, with a cargo of salt. She is the first arrival of the season.

THE Master of the Rolls gave judgment to-day in the case argued before him last week, with reference to the Breastwork on Stanley River, and dissolved the Injunction.

WE still continue to keep more people at Rockin House than at any other Hotel on Prince Edward Island, and drive them to and from trains and steamers free of charge.

THE Supreme Court met to-day. There are six appeals on the docket, and several rules to be argued for new trials. Two Atlas cases on the docket are put off for want of witnesses.

CRICKET.—The annual general meeting of Phoenix Cricket Club, was held as advertised, on Saturday last. The Secretary's report having been read and unanimously adopted, the officers for the season were then elected.

A field Committee composed of Jas. McArthur, S. Jenkins, R. Higgs and F. Kennedy, were also appointed.

LINDLEY OPERA CO.—Last evening "Cynthia the Zingarella" was the piece de resistance, and served admirably to exhibit the talents of Miss Helen Adell in the title role. Her personification was admirable, and her acting showed that she possessed strong, tragic and emotional power. Miss Forster's "Starlight Bess" is a role well fitted for this artist. Mr. J. F. Bird, as "the Wolf," was sufficient. The "Two Comics"—Messrs. Lindley and Tavernier—were grotesque and humorous enough, their legal escapades being the height of absurdity. Mr. J. D. Walsh, as Lemuel, was simply immense—the part being admirably adapted to his physique. Mr. John Mills was up to the standard as "Alfred." The first piece—"H. M. S. Spitfire"—is a nautical comedy and very funny; but the sea battle was evidently out of gear, as although cannon balls were flying through the air, they must have been impelled by hydraulic or other pressure, inasmuch as they arrived without the usual noisy cannonade. To-night a piece familiar to all players—the "Streets of New York"—will be produced, for which special features are offered, viz., a fire scene with aid of local firemen, section carts, etc., and novel effects. The piece will be supplemented by a new farce.

THE REGISTRY OFFICE.—The statement in last Saturday's *Patriot* respecting the Registry Office, lacks the essential element. The facts of the case are simply these: At the time Mr. Davies' Government came into office the work in the Registry Office was some months in arrears. Mr. Davies, in order to have the work brought up, put extra help into the office and increased the work gradually from 20 to 30 folios per day, at which last figure it remained, any Clerk copying more than 30 folios per day being allowed 8 cents per folio for the extra work performed. The 40 folio system was made by an order in Council of the 15th December, 1878, and continued up to the formation of Mr. Sullivan's Government, and for some time afterward; but no extra work over the 40 folios was paid for or performed. Does the writer of the article in the *Patriot* mean to say that to properly write and compare 40 folios per day during office hours is not too much work, if so, he lies under a mistake either willfully or through ignorance. The Clerks in the Registry Office have been writing and comparing 35 folios per day since the 1st of January; and comparing the amount of work required from them and the salaries they receive with that of other officials, we must say that they are insufficiently paid. The number of folios copied by the Clerks from the 1st of April, 1879 to first of March 1880, as given by the Auditor, we assume to be correct. The statement shows that the Acting Assistant Registrar fell wide of the mark of 30 folios per diem when he only wrote 1427 folios in 132 days. Mr. Peterson was for some time Acting Registrar, and if he has fallen short of the work required of him (of which we have no positive proof) it must have been caused by the bad example set by his predecessor. There is but a puny difference, the proverb says, between he who works and he who plays, and the one that plays gets it. Will not the writer in the *Patriot*, from his own experience, say "that's so."

CIVIC.—A public meeting was held in Ward 5, in the Warehouse of Henry Coombs, Esq., for the purpose of nominating two candidates to represent Ward 5 at the coming civic election. Mr. Henry Rackam was appointed chairman. The meeting was addressed by Messrs. Welsh, McKinnon, Horne, C. G. Knight, DeRoche, Beer, Newson, Martin, Gates, Coombs, Lawson, C. G., and Farquharson, M. P. P. They all agreed that we should have the best men we could get for representation in the Council. All the speakers were in favor of the present representatives. Several nominations were, however, made. Moved by L. L. Beer, Esq., seconded by Joseph Knight, Esq., that Mr. John Newson be a fit and proper person to represent the Eastern end of Ward 5, for the coming election—carried, with a few dissenting voices. Moved by Donald McKinnon, Esq., seconded by J. E. Curtis, Esq., that Mr. Thomas McLean be a fit and proper person to represent Ward 5 at the coming election—Motion lost. Moved by David Lawson, Esq., seconded by Angus D. Martin, Esq., that Alexander Horne, Esq., be a fit and proper person to represent Ward 5 at the coming election—Carried almost unanimously. Moved by Walter Lowe, Esq., seconded by Donald McKinnon, Esq., that Henry B. Smith, Esq., be a fit and proper person to represent Ward 5 at the coming election.—Motion carried. Moved by William Welsh, Esq., and seconded by Angus D. Martin, Esq., that the meeting pledge themselves to support the nominations of Messrs. Horne and Newson at the coming election. The motion was put and carried almost unanimously. Moved—that a committee of three be appointed to meet the committees from other wards, to nominate a Mayor. The committee are Alexander McKinnon, Esq., Benjamin Hooper, Esq., and Henry Coombs, Esq. A vote of thanks was tendered to the Chairman and Secretary, then the meeting adjourned. CIVIC ELECTION. BY THE MAYOR.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled, "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, chapter thirty-four, intitled, 'An Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown,' and all Acts amending the same," I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election of

A Mayor and Two Persons to Serve as Common Councilmen

in the City Council for each Ward of said City, being in all

A Mayor and Ten Councilmen,

WILL BE HELD ON

THURSDAY,

The Thirteenth Day of May Next, A. D. 1880.

at the several places, that is to say:

In Ward No. 1, at or near the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets.

In Ward No. 2, at or near the Warehouse of Richard Heartz, Esq., fronting on Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets.

In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House.

In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets.

In Ward No. 5, at or near the house of Widow Tierney, corner of Great George and Euston Streets.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at Nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until Five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS.

Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street, and the parcel of land formerly known as the Military Barrack Ground.

Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street.

Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street.

Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy Street and north of Grafton Street.

Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the common of the said Town.

QUALIFICATION OF MAYOR AND COUNCILLORS.

Section 5, of Act 13 Victoria, Cap. 34, as amended by Act 43 Victoria: "No person being in Holy Orders, or being a Minister or Teacher, duly licensed by any denomination of Christians in this Colony, shall be qualified to be elected Mayor or a Councillor of the said City, nor shall any one be qualified to be elected Mayor of the said City who shall not be seized or possessed of freehold or leasehold property, or both, situate in the said City, of the value of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above all legally recorded incumbrances; and no shall any person be qualified to be elected a Councillor of the said City who shall not be seized or possessed of freehold or leasehold property, or both, situate in the said City, to the amount of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS, over and above all legally recorded incumbrances, or who shall not be in the possession, use, or occupation, of premises in the City of the yearly rent of or assessed at TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS per annum; nor during such time as such person shall hold any office or place of profit in the gift or disposal of the said Council, or during such time as he shall have, directly or indirectly, by himself or his partner, any share or interest in any contract or employment with or on behalf of the Council; provided that no person shall be disqualified from being a Councillor, as aforesaid, by reason of his being a proprietor or shareholder of any incorporated company."

NOMINATION OF MAYOR AND COUNCILLORS.

Act 43 Victoria: "Seven Days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councillors, the persons candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and additions of such persons, together with the office and Wards for which they are candidates; and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination by such candidates.

"There shall be paid by each person, so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of Ten Dollars; and by each person so nominated as Councillor, a fee of Five Dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of Election.

"No person shall be qualified, either for the office of Mayor or Councillor, unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid.

"The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon until the hour of Four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose."

QUALIFICATION OF ELECTORS.

From Section 20, Act 43 Victoria: "At all elections of Mayor, or of a Councillor or Councillors, for said City, all the Male inhabitants of the age of twenty-one years, and upwards, who shall have resided in the said City for at least one year then next preceding the day of election, being British subjects, and each of whom shall actually, and within the Wards for which he shall vote, then be and for three months previously shall have been:

1. Actually and in his own right the bona fide owner of the Freehold of lands or premises in said City of the assessed value of One Hundred Dollars upon which all assessment due has been paid;

2. In the Tenancy or Occupancy of any lands, premises, or tenements of the yearly rental of Fourteen Dollars, however payable; Provided that every partner, whose share of the rent amounts to Fourteen Dollars annually, shall be entitled to vote; and that every male British subject of the age aforesaid, Non-resident of the said City, who shall be doing business, and in actual occupation of business or other premises in said City, and

shall be qualified to vote under any of the qualifications aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote for such Mayor and Councillors in the Ward in which the property on which he claims the right to vote is situate; and Non-resident Owners of Real Estate, otherwise qualified, shall vote in the Ward where their qualification lies.

Section 63 of the Act 43 Victoria reads as follows: "For the purposes of the election to be held next after the passing of this Act no owner, tenant or occupier shall be deprived of his franchise or right to vote by reason of his not having paid the rates and assessments then due by him, it being in all cases sufficient evidence of such person, otherwise duly qualified, that he is the owner occupier, or tenant of premises of the value or yearly rental of fourteen dollars.
