

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

## The Walking Match. The "Unknown" Leads.

Special despatch to the Examiner

SUMMERSIDE, Sept. 22.

The go-as-you-please match between Eph Clow and the "Unknown" commenced in Ludlow Hall at 11 o'clock sharp this forenoon. Mr. Finlay McNeill, referee and starter sent the men off together. There were not many spectators present. The men are in very good condition. The "Unknown" led from the start, and at 1 o'clock the score stood:—

"Unknown," 16 miles.  
Clow, 15 miles, 17 laps.

### EUROPEAN.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 20.

Fresh difficulties have arisen over the Montenegrin question. The Sultan insists on the powers simultaneously recognizing the new frontier line from Lake Scutari to Dinosh before Dulcigno is surrendered.

LONDON, Sept. 20.

The Paris correspondent of the Times writes: "De Freycinet fails because in his Montauban speech he declared the government would pursue its policy without blustering, which was a reply to Gambetta's Cherbourg speech and to the blustering policy therein contained. He fails because he publicly ventured to throw off Gambetta's leading strings."

PARIS, Sept. 20.

Five thousand cabinet makers of this city have struck.

DULCIGNO, Sept. 20.

A foreign man-of-war is taking soundings off the coast, in order, it is supposed, to be in preparation for the demonstration.

PARIS, Sept. 10.

The Bourse, referring to the joint purchase arrangement of the Anglo-American and French Cable Companies, suggests that the present negotiations may be spoiled by the interference of too many negotiations.

### UNITED STATES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20.

Capt. Nelson, of the sch. Western Home, which has arrived in seventeen days from Alaska, reports the Arctic revenue cutter Thomas Corwin is lying at one of the small ports, unable to proceed owing to the immense flocks of ice. Ice this year has offered more difficulties to voyagers of northern seas than has been known for years. It came down earlier than usual and packs thicker. There is hope, however, of the Corwin being able to proceed in her search for the Jeannette and missing whalers as soon as a break in the ice occurs.

Michal Davitt, an Irish agitator, has arrived. A large procession of Irish civil and military societies received Davitt and escorted him through the principal streets to the Grand Opera House building, which was densely packed. General W. S. Rosecranz presided. Davitt delivered an address on the Irish landlordism. The following telegram was submitted for the approval of the audience and despatched:—"To Land League, Dublin: One hundred thousand people welcome Davitt. Hold the harvest. No surrender to landlord tyranny. (Signed) W. S. Rosecranz, chairman. The demonstration throughout was most enthusiastic."

MARYSVILLE, Mo., Sept. 20.

Dr. P. E. Talbott, editor of the "Greenback Standard," was shot through the window of his bedroom on Saturday night by an unknown assassin. The bullet also slightly wounded Mrs. Talbott. Talbott died on Sunday.

CORNING, Ohio, Sept. 20.

Striking miners attempted to come within the lines established by Ewing Guards. They responded with a volley of musketry. The fire was returned, and kept up for five minutes. The striking miners divided their forces into three parties, and simultaneously attacked the troops. The Corning miners were on two ridges, extending to the north and south of what is known as mine No. 3. The column on the north side was 200 strong and well armed. The miners opened fire from both ridges, but scattered and fled precipitately after the troops had fired a few rounds. They made an effort afterwards to make another onslaught, but could not succeed. The striking miners are said to be returning to their homes. The number in the attack is said to have been five hundred. It is thought there will be no further disturbance.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 20.

At Milltown on Saturday, five men engaged in a fight in a bar-room. John Hancock was shot through the lungs and will die. Simon Hancock was shot in the breast dangerously. Three others were also shot, but not badly hurt. Twenty-six shots were fired.

DETROIT, Sept. 20.

A terrible tragedy occurred at Sonerville, Hillsdale County, on Sunday afternoon. Henry Lindley, a hired man in the employ of Mr. Tiffany, who is supposed to have conceived a passion for his employer's second daughter Alice, called on her and shot her killing her instantly. Lindley then blew out his own brains, falling with the weapon under him. The only cause known to which the crime can be attributed is unrequited love. The murdered girl was eighteen years old.

DAYTON, Ohio, Sept. 20.

Lee Brumbaugh, a prominent attorney of Miamessburg, was killed this afternoon by George Ware, of Dayton. Brumbaugh has for sometime been suspected of criminal intimacy with Ware's wife during the latter's absence. Ware returned home unannounced this afternoon, found them together, shot Brumbaugh and then delivered himself up to the officers.

SIXTY-ONE YEARS A LAWYER.—The senior member of the legal profession in P. E. Island departed this life at Charlottetown, on the 16th inst., in the person of Sir Robert Hodgson, the late Licut. Governor of that Province. The deceased gentleman was admitted to the bar on the 26th September, 1819; and had he survived but ten days more he would have been in the profession for the period of 61 years. This long connexion with the law is of rare occurrence in any country; and few, if any, similar instances can be found in the Dominion.—St. John Sun.
