Set June 30 Date For Prorogation

OTTAWA, May 28 - (CP) - Parliament will open its sessional prorogation drive in a few days, with June 30 as a target.

Whether or not it hits or misses that date, the Commons will begin this Thursday to sit three times a day - morning, afternoon and night - Monday through Friday until sessional deliberations are completed. The Wednesday evening off, which is customary until this stage of the session, will be abolished.

The Chamber's hours then will be 11 A. M. to 1 P. M., 3 P. M. to 6 P. M. and 8 P. M. to 11 P. M.

The Senate, which takes its parliamentary life a little easier, will not go on so strenuous a working schedule, but is expected to step up its activities nonetheless.

Veteran parliamentarians estimate it will take four full weeks of three-a-day sittings for Parliament to deal with the mass of legislation still awaiting attention.

Gift of \$250,000 For Manitoba Flood Emergency

A gift of \$250,000 to assist Canadian Red Cross to continue flood relief work in Manitoba has been received from the Washington Headquarters of the American Red Cross.

A telegram signed by General George C. Marshall, President of the American National Red Cross, expressing "deepest concern and sympathy of the people of the United States" offered the quarter-million dollar gift.

The offer was accepted by John A. Macaulay, Chairman, Central Council, Canadian Red Cross, who gave assurance that "this magnificent gift will be a great stimulus to the people of Manitoba and Canada in this time of distress."

The donation from American Red Cross arrived as Canadian Red Cross officials here were taking stock of the tremendous job of emergency relief to flood victims still facing them.

During the past few weeks, Red Cross has provided emergency shelter, food, clothing and medical care for almost 20,000 persons and has directly evacuated 5,000 flood victims. Until the return to normal, the tremendous job of emergency relief will have to be continued.

Expect Blossoms For Festival Sunday

KENTVILLE, N. S., May 28 - (CP) - Warm weather during the past few days has increased the prospect for a full-blooming Annapolis Valley for the apple blossom festival June 2-5, farmers reported tonight.

Already the earlier varieties of trees are about ready to bloom and a fairly heavy bloom is indicated.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 28 - (CP) - Caddy is back.

Mrs. Kildred McClure of Sydney, B. C., says Vancouver Island's fabulous "sea serpent" made a leisurely, 15-minute visit to Isala Bay Friday night.

Mrs. McClure said she saw "something with a head like a goat" emerge from the calm sea about 30 feet from shore. Mrs. McClure said the serpent appeared to be at least 30 feet long.

Soggy Manitoba Dries Rapidly

WINNIPEG, May 28 - (CP) - Soggy Manitoba dried rapidly today under a blazing western sun. The Red continued its headlong drop.

The twin cities of Winnipeg and St. Boniface drowsed through a warm, quiet Sunday. A light breeze lifted dust on Portage Avenue.

The great flood of 1950 was fast becoming a distant, unreal past to those not directly affected by the greatest disaster to hit Manitoba since it became a Province in 1870. The crisis was over.

As the newly-created Manitoba Flood Rehabilitation Authority prepared to swing into action, many thousands forced from their homes by dirty, silt-laden water spent the day assessing their losses.

At many points in the area, two weeks ago a battleground for 5,000 service men and 50,000 volunteer civilians against the river, recession of the flood permitted inspection of houses and business property.

But most of the 80,000 city and rural dwellers who retreated as the Red River and its tributaries spread over 600 square miles of Southern Manitoba cannot return to their property until municipal clean-up squads have completed house spring cleaning will be finished cannot even be estimated. It obviously will take weeks.

Two thousand of the 5,000 army, navy and air force men who, at Premier Douglas L. Campbell's request, took over May 6 direction of all Red River flood control, already have been stood down. The other 3,000 will leave rapidly as civil authorities resume their responsibilities. Brig. Ronald Morrison's flood-control headquarters in the Legislative Building will be closed Tuesday or Wednesday.

The river level at 3 P. M. CDT today was 27.0 feet, a fall of seven-tenths of a foot in 24 hours. It has been dropping steadily for the last week though it still is about nine feet above the point where flooding begins in the greater Winnipeg area. Risk that any dike will break is remote.

Wool Marketing

Wool will be received at the Potato Growers' warehouse at the foot of Prince Street, Charlottetown, after June 5th. Wool shipped by rail should be carefully tagged and addressed to the Wool Grading Station, Charlottetown, "Freight Collect". Wool shipped by truck will be entitled to rail rates only. Truckers must present a proper warehouse receipt before truckage will be paid. An advance will be made on all wool of satisfactory quality, and properly prepared for marketing. The balance will be paid as soon as wool is graded.

In shipping, each fleece should be tied separately with paper string and packed in old, but clean sacking. Do not ship in large number of bags. Use one large sack if at all possible, as this aids in checking. A number of old, clean sacks sewed together will suffice. EACH SACK SHOULD BE TAGGED WITH THE NAME AND ADDRESS OF THE OWNER WRITTEN IN CLEAR LETTERING WITH INK, ONE TAG TO BE SECURELY ATTACHED TO THE OUTSIDE OF THE SACK AND ANOTHER PLACED ON THE INSIDE. No responsibility will be accepted for sacks without tags. A deduction of one cent per pound will be made for wool tied with binder twine or other unsatisfactory string. Shipping tags and proper paper twine are available at the Provincial Department of Agriculture free of charge.

It is in your interest to see that wool is properly prepared for market. Growers should

1. Remove all tags and dung locks before tying each fleece.
2. Any burry, chaffy, or strawy portions of wool should also be removed and shipped separately.
3. Sheep should be shorn when dry, and wool should be stored in a place free from dampness.

All wool should be delivered between June 5th and July 15th.
