SIR CHARLES AND MR. BLAIR.

THERE seems to be cause for the personal feeling exhibited by Mr. Blair in respect to Sir Charles Tupper. For, at Fredericton, Sir Charles contrasted his public conduct with that of Mr. Foster, charging that he "had held power in New Brunswick by corrupting the representatives of the people with the people's money." Sir Charles added that Mr. Blair had endeavored to carry this out on a larger scale in Dominion affairs. This was, Sir Charles said, "the lowest and most contemptible standard a public man could descend to, for a man who was unable to command the support of the men of the highest intelligence was unfit for public life." Sir Charles traced Mr. Blair's career in the House, and gave a history of the Drummond County deal and how Mr. Tarte's sons acquired La Prairie. He showed how the Intercolonial could have been brought into Montreal over the Quebec bridge without costing an extra cent. But this did not commend itself to Mr. Blair, "for there is nothing in it for the boy."

Sir Charles also gave a history, in brief, of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway deal as showing Mr. Blair's incapacity and then went on to show how Mr. Powell had dissected and destroyed his claims in regard to the Intercolonial management. Yes! Mr. Blair has cause for his "pity" for Sir Charles!

A WORTHLESS PLEA.

MR. BLAIR'S plea for the purchase of the Drummond County railway might be considered a good one if there had not been already two railways and the St. Lawrence river affording means of communication between Montreal and the Maritime Provinces. To the competition of these, the Minister of Railways has added the Drummond County Railway at a cost, including that of the Grand Trunk connections, of about \$7,000,000, though as Sir Charles Tupper has pointed out, the Intercolonial might have secured connection via the C. P. R. by the construction of a railway bridge at Quebec. As it is, the country has the Drummond County railway on its hands, and has yet to build the bridge at Quebec.

DISSOLUTION OF PARTNERSHIP

The firm of Laurier, Mowat and Victory, formed in 1896, has been dissolved. Mowat, at the earliest opportunity took a Lieutenant-Governorship, and Victory has retired from the firm, which is now known as Laurier-Tarte and D'Amat!

IT WON'T DO.

A FALSE REPORT.

He is not a Conservative but a devout Liberal and Sir Wilfrid Laurier's law partner. He didn't attack Sir Wilfrid. The despatch to the Guardian was evidently made for a purpose.


