GIVEN UP FOR LOST.—The Gloucester schooner Hustler has not been heard from since October 10th and has been given up for lost. She carried a crew of fourteen, among whom were John A. Macdonald, of Little Harbor, and Malcolm Mathison, of Montague, in this province.
