MISSIONARY HARDSHIPS.—In a recent letter the Rev. Mr. Annand, who with Mrs. Annand sailed for the New Hebrides a few months ago to continue their missionary work, states that their vessel was wrecked off the coast of Malo, not far from the Island of Santo, their new mission field. Their goods were considerably damaged by the salt water, a large portion of them having been lost altogether. For twenty-two days they lived in a tent on the coast and endured severe hardships. At the time of writing, however, they had reached Santo and erected a house and were encouraged at the outlook. Mr. and Mrs. Annand are well known in Charlottetown where they have many friends.

THE ELECTRIC LIGHT.—The exhaust pipe of the boiler in the electric light station burst shortly before nine o'clock on Wednesday evening, and as a result all the lights throughout the city had to be at once extinguished. For the remainder of the night the city was in darkness the most intense. Owing to the fact that our sidewalks are in a terribly bad condition, and several of the street crossings have recently been taken up or have become so far buried beneath the mud as to be invisible, it was extremely unpleasant if not dangerous for pedestrians to be abroad. It was almost a matter of impossibility to keep out of the mud holes which abounded, owing to the rain during the day; indeed several persons were obliged to fall back upon the good old Lecture match to light themselves along.

French Politics.

Absolute Confusion

GREAT EXCITEMENT.

PARIS, Nov. 17.

The Chamber of Deputies has sanctioned the prosecution of M. Wilson. M. Mascan has resigned. President Grevy has entrusted M. Fallieres temporarily with the duties of Minister of Justice.

A plenary meeting of the Republican groups of the Senate and Chambers will be summoned to-morrow to arrange terms of interpellation in reference to Grevy, which will be moved in the chamber on Saturday.

An excited discussion is going on in reference to the successor of Grevy. M. Ferry, DeFreycinet, Floquet, Florens Levasseur and Jules Simon, each has supporters. Absolute confusion prevails. The latest nominee of the moderates is Gen. Sausier, Governor of Paris, who will command the votes for sections of the right. The extreme left continues to cling to M. Grevy.

INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION.

The British Commissioners.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 17.

Joseph Chamberlain and Sir Charles Tupper arrived this afternoon, and were immediately driven to the Arlington Hotel, where 37 rooms had been engaged for them and party. Five were set apart for Chamberlain personally, and eight or ten others are occupied by the Canadian members of the party and two gentlemen from the British Foreign Office who accompany Chamberlain. The other rooms are for the personal attendants of the Commissioners.

Ontario News.

TORONTO, Nov. 17.

The Ontario Government offers \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the parties guilty of the dynamite outrage on Scott Act Inspector Anderson, of Orangeville.

There is a general belief that the Central Bank will in a few days be in a position to meet all demand on resuming business. Other banks yesterday declined to accept its notes, but brokers were taking them at from 80 to 90 cents. The bank is perfectly solvent, but reckless management led to its suspension.

Trade and the Tariff.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.

It is understood that the negotiations with Spain for a direct treaty are suspended for the present; but will probably be resumed immediately after the Fisheries Commission has concluded its labors.

The Minister of Customs has decided to have published from month to month, all the departmental ruling with reference to articles unenumerated on the tariff.

Another Anarchist Locked Up.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.

Johann Most, Anarchist, was arrested to-day at the office of his newspaper and locked up, for having made an incendiary speech calculated to incite riot on Friday night in this city.

Challenge to be Withdrawn.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

The Royal Clyde Yacht Club will withdraw its challenge to compete for the America Cup on the ground that the conditions as charged are unjust and unsportsmanlike.

Another Eviction.

DUBLIN, Nov. 17.

During an eviction near Dunganan to-day, four policemen, several bailiffs and twenty spectators were injured.

The Pope Memorial.

MR. JAMES PHILLIPS, stone-cutter, of this city, has lately set up in the Church of England Cemetery, at Saint Eleanors, a suitable monument to the late Hon. J. C. Pope. It is of polished red granite, four feet square at the base and fifteen feet high; and is, without doubt, the finest memorial stone in the Province. It bears the following inscription:—

The Canada Atlantic Line to Boston.

(Halifax Chronicle.)

A Chronicle reporter was shown yesterday by Mr. B. W. Chipman, one of the directors of the Canada Atlantic Steamship company, the models and plans of the two new steamers now building on the Clyde for this company by the London and Glasgow Shipbuilding company. They are being built of steel and are to be of the following dimensions. Tonnage, about 1,500; length, 100 feet; breadth, moulded, 35 feet; depth 23 feet. They will have water-tight bulkheads, and their engines are to be triple expansion, of sufficient power to obtain a speed of 15 knots. The saloons are to be spacious apartments on the main deck, 80 feet in length, 40 feet of which will occupy the full width of the ships. From these saloons a companion-way will lead to the awning or promenade deck, which will extend almost the full length of the ships. There is also on the main deck, forward a spacious "social hall," off which there will be some thirty state rooms. There will also be several family and bridal state rooms on this deck. Under the saloon, in the 'tween deck, aft, there will be an elegant ladies' cabin having over 40 berths. Forward of the ladies' cabin will be the lower saloons, in which there will be 35 state rooms. All the sofas and seats in the saloons will be constructed so that they can be converted, when required, into comfortable beds, being divided into sections by means of portable curtains, similar to the equipment of Pullman sleeping cars. The ships throughout will be elegantly upholstered and furnished. State rooms and lavatory will be supplied with hot and cold water, and the ships throughout lighted with the incandescent electric light. There will be bath-rooms, smoking rooms, barber's shop and all modern conveniences. In fact, they are to have all the most modern improvements of the highest class, sufficient cargo capacity for the carrying of lobsters and fresh fish, with passenger accommodations, in all, for over 400.

It is expected that each ship will make three round trips per month between Boston, Halifax and P. E. Island, and that they will make the run from Halifax to Boston in about 24 hours, which will be 12 hours quicker than the shortest all-rail route.
