MONTREAL. (CP)—Shawinigan Water and Power Co. is testing titanium to determine whether it can be produced commercially at a competitive price but there is no official word whether it will be sold to Canadair Ltd. for use in airplanes.
 A Shawinigan spokesman said Tuesday the metal produced in its laboratories is strong and light with great heat resistance.
 Canadair, meanwhile, declined comment on a report in Canadian Aviation Magazine that the firm is interested in titanium to replace stainless steel for engine walls in the CL128 aircraft, reconnaissance version of the Bristol Britannia to be produced for the R. C. A. F.
 The CL-28 would have easier take-offs, reach higher altitudes and be more manoeuvrable if the stainless steel was replaced by titanium, aviation sources said.
 The light-weight metal, costing \$21 a pound against 60 cents for stainless steel, would increase cost of the CL-28 by \$17,000.
