Mr. Peppin Advises Growers
Re 1952 Potato Crop Planting

Need of early roguing of potato
fields and other suggestions for
planting of the 1952 potato crop
are given in the following state-
ment released for publication yes-
terday by Mr. S. G. Peppin,
technical advisor to the P. E. I.
Potato Marketing Board:
"In a recent article on potato
production we endeavored to point
out that growers would do well to
weigh carefully the various cost
items involved in producing an
acre of potatoes. The principal and
heaviest cost items are: seed,
fertilizer and labor but there also
are a number of incidental items
which add considerable to the
overall cost structure. We placed
this cost at a nominal figure of
\$200.00 per acre and which, in the
light of present seed, fertilizer,
and labor costs, is by no means
excessive.

and Entomology, which emphasiz-
ed several important factors in
preparing seed tubers for planting.
These timely bulletins are issued
periodically and contain up to the
minute information and advice
which should be read and studied
carefully by all farmers in the
province.

Sabago Plantings
The greatest acreage of any
one variety is the Sabago, of which
over 10,000 acres were planted last
year. This variety requires even
better care than any other since it
seems to be more subject to cer-
tain troubles and diseases. It is
very susceptible to seed piece de-
cay as well as to black leg and
every farmer knows he cannot
produce a profitable crop when there
is a high percentage of missing
hills. The Sabago variety should
be cut and planted in the field
and preferably in tuber units from
seed which has been exposed to
the out-doors long enough to
produce the short thick sprouts
mentioned before.

Best Seed Required
It is to be hoped that growers
have retained the best seed stock
for this year's plantings. Tubers
that are affected with late blight,
fusarium, or other rot producing
organisms should not be used. Sim-
ilarly, tubers that have been
bruised or cut may also carry dis-
ease organisms which in turn may
affect the cut seed at or sub-
sequent to planting and thus cause
missing hills. Off-type tubers, par-
ticularly of the Sabago variety,
should not be used if there is any
possibility of them being affected
with spindle tuber.
