## Rev. R.D. Sandford To Be Inducted

Rev. R.D. Sandford, minister of Bethel Presbyterian Church, West Riverview, New Brunswick has accepted a call from

from Pyongyang as a hypocritical gesture. U.S. authorities say North Korea has 25 to 30 pilots in North Vietnam, apparently training North Vietnamese flyers in air warfare.

Australia is sending 900 more troops, the guided-missile destroyer Hobart and a squadron of eight Canberra jet bombers to bolster the anti-Communist cause in Vietnam, Prime Minister Harold Holt announced in Canberra. He said these land, sea and air reinforcements will beef up the 4,500-man Australian contingent to 4,300 men early next year.

—South Vietnamese Premier Nguyen Cao Ky said he U.S. should continue bombing North Vietnam until Hanoi responds to moves for peace talks.

**DEATHS DECLINE**  
Operational reports of Thursday coincided with issuance of casualty figures that showed a decline in combat deaths among the anti-Communist allies and a rise in the toll on the enemy last week, compared with the action in the previous week.

A total of 28 Americans were killed during the week — five more than from Dec. 4 through Dec. 19 and the unofficial total through five years of war rose to 6,497.

U.S. officials give this picture of what the Viet Cong are planning:

The Communists plan to weed out ineffectual members, to review the effectiveness of veteran leaders and to discard those "who lack Gung Ho enthusiasm or seem to fear the Americans."

At the same time, they are opening up their membership rolls for more party recruits. It is understood new membership quotas already have been set up in certain provinces. This is a reversal of traditional Communist party practice, which elsewhere in the world invariably has relied on an elite group, small, disciplined and manageable.

After a fruitful and progressive ministry, lasting more than 4 years, he accepted an appointment to serve in the Church's Pilot Project in the area of Albert County, New Brunswick.

Mr. and Mrs. Sandford have two children: a son who is farming in Quebec, and a daughter who after receiving an honors BA from Bishop's University, Lennoxville, Quebec, has gone to Edinburgh University in Scotland, to study for her Master Degree in Literature. Mr. Sandford will succeed Rev. George R. Tannahill who is now the pastor of the North Tryon charge, and will officiate at the induction service.

## 450 CONVICTS HOLD PARTY FOR GROUP OF ORPHANS

MONTREAL (CP)—A busload of little orphans — aged two to five — and 450 convicts showed Montrealeers what Christmas should be about when they held their own wonderful, romping party in a prison gymnasium.

Outsiders had a hard time swallowing when the tots from St. Francois d'Assise Orphanage jumped out of their bus Wednesday and rushed into the arms of the prisoners of Leclerc medium-security prison in suburban Laval.

Santa, a bank robber serving 12 to 20 years, scooped up an armful of cheering fans and roared with laughter as they jumped all over him.

Then there was a surge into the gymnasium for the presents. The convicts contributed \$603 to buy them — made up of about a week's pay from each — and they had obtained double the money's worth through hard bargaining and sympathetic shopkeepers.

Bernard, a crew-cut tot scrambled over the packages,

kiddycars, horses, giant bears and basketballs, into the bandstand and began to sing. Next thing, he was sitting on the knee of the beaming sax player, who is doing 14 years for a bank burglary.

But for some it was too much. One man doing a long term got an exuberant kiss from a three-year-old moppet. He turned with tears in his eyes and walked slowly off to his cell.

While the party swung along through the singing, games, ice cream and candy, Nick, a lifer and chief organizer of the event, was in a minor panic. The biggest present of all — a \$500 gymnasium set contributed by a shoe manufacturer and imported from the U.S. — hadn't turned up.

Just as the last of the ice cream was disappearing into eager mouths, Nick came back with the good news that it had been located and will be deposited in the chimney of St. Francois d'Assise on schedule.
