**LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE
CONVENTION IN KING'S.**

Mr. A. C. McDonald, M. P., Unani-
mously Nominated.

The Hon. D. Gordon, President of the
Liberal-Conservative Association for the
riding of King's, presided at the conven-
tion held at Dandras on Wednesday, the
11th, for the purpose of nominating a
candidate to contest the county in the
Liberal Conservative interest at the next
election.

The meeting having been called to order
by the President,—
John McLean, Esq., ex-M. P., Souris,
stepped forward and in a few well chosen
remarks proposed Mr. A. C. McDonald,
M. P.

The motion was seconded by Robert
Curran, Esq. of Baldwin's, and carried
unanimously amid great enthusiasm.

Mr. Macdonald then took the platform,
thanked the convention for their enthu-
siastic nomination, and in a stirring speech
showed up the shortcomings of the Gov-
ernment, their many broken pledges and
their present support of measures which
they so strenuously opposed when in op-
position. Mr. Macdonald's remarks were
well received and he resumed his seat amid
rounds of applause.

The President read a letter from Cyrus
Shaw, Esq., M. L. A., regretting that his
health prevented his attendance and ex-
pressing his loyalty to whatever course
the party decided to adopt at the Con-
vention.

Mr. John Dewar, of New Perth, then
delivered an eloquent speech and ended
by moving the following resolution:

Whereas our grand old leader, Sir
Charles Tupper, has by his untiring energy,
prudence and sagacity contributed much
towards infusing a spirit of enthusiasm
into the ranks of the opposition,—

Resolved, therefore, that this conven-
tion take the opportunity of expressing its
great admiration of his worth and abili-
ties as a statesman as well as its high ap-
preciation of his valuable services as leader,
and trust that he may long be spared
to guide the destinies of the Liberal Con-
servative party.

This resolution was ably seconded in a
rousing speech by J. G. Sterns, Esq.,
Souris, and carried unanimously with three
cheers and a tiger for the great Liberal
Conservative leader.

J. C. Underhay, Esq. moved the follow-
ing resolution which after a few appro-
priate remarks was seconded by Mr.
Sterns and carried:

Whereas, It has pleased Almighty God
in His infinite wisdom to remove from
amongst us a political leader who was
always a prominent and welcome figure at
our meetings, in the person of the late
respected and lamented John P. Sullivan:
Resolved, therefore, that we hereby
record an expression of the deep loss we
have sustained in the death of a wise
councillor, an able organizer and a true,
honest and noble man.

After capital speeches from John Mc-
Lean, Souris, A. W. Bruce, Red Point; Jas
H. Dingwell, Morell; James McLean,
Charlottetown, and others,—Mr. Saville,
of Annapdale, took the floor, condemned
the deception practiced upon the temper-
ance people of Canada by the Govern-
ment, commended Mr. A. C. McDonald's
action in Parliament denouncing the
double dealing of the Government on the
plebiscite, and ended a well constructed
and ably delivered speech by moving:

Whereas, our present member, Mr. A. C.
McDonald, has merited the support of the
temperance party of King's County by his
vote on the prohibition resolutions in the
past session;

Resolved, that this convention desires to
express its satisfaction at his action and
express its desire for him to continue to
vote and speak in the same manner in
future.

This resolution was seconded by Charles
Clay, Esq., put to the meeting, and carried
unanimously.

Mr. A. C. McDonald said that while
never pledged on any question, he had felt
it his duty to support the temperance peo-
ple as expressed by their vote on the
Plebiscite, and would continue to do so if
elected.

After three cheers had been given for
our much respected President, three cheers
for Messrs. A. C. Macdonald and John
McLean, the assembly arose, and sang "God
Save the Queen."

Thus ended the most unanimous,
enthusiastic and representative convention
ever held in this Province, and those who
honored it with their presence left for
their homes, feeling that their time had
been well spent and that their prospects
were never brighter for the biggest victory
they ever had in the country.

SCHOONER STRANDED.—The schooner
owned by Captain Moran, of Charlottetown,
is reported stranded at Sea Cow Head.
The schooner was from Charlottetown to
Point du Chene. On Friday night, or
early the following morning, while lying at
anchor near the scene of the accident, a
gale came up and she dragged her anchor
and stranded. The schooner was in ballast
and was not insured.

ST. JOSEPH'S SODALITY.—A meeting of
St. Joseph's Sodality was held in St.
Joseph's Convent last evening to welcome
Mother St. Angelina, who for many years
was Superior of the Convent. On
behalf of the society, the secretary, Miss

P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL.—The follow-
ing resolution was unanimously passed by
the Board of Trustees of the P. E. Island
Hospital at a meeting on Oct. 10th, 1899:
"Inasmuch as the Board have agreed that
the hospital be furnished in a uniform
manner, it is therefore decided that all the
furniture for the new hospital be purchased
by the Board.

"Societies or persons desirous of furni-
shing any room or rooms are requested to
inform the Board of such their desire, and
any funds provided by them will be ex-
pended by the Board in accordance with
their wishes and the design above stated."

Further Resolved: "that all moneys col-
lected for hospital purposes by any and
every means or persons be paid to the
Treasurer of the Board of Trustees to be
expended solely under order of the Board.

BOARD OF TRADE.—The regular quar-
terly meeting of the Board of Trade was
held last night. The carriage of freight
between Point du Chene and Charlottetown
was brought up. The telegraph system
was referred to, and improvements sug-
gested. Mr. R. B. Nor on again brought
up the matter of ice landings in winter
and moved the following resolution, sec-
onded by Mr. Fennell. Resolved that the
attention of the city council
be called to the fact that in the
interest of the city it would be advisable
that proper landings be provided for the
convenience of people from the South side
of the Hillsboro and West River also west
of North River and that the city council
make some effort to provide such landings
until ice is solidly formed in fall breaking
up in spring, carried. The insufficiency
in the numbers of freight cars was dis-
cussed. The matter was left in the hands
of the council.
