EDUCATIONAL MILE-STONE

Our vocational school in Sum-
merside High School has been ad-
opted by the Provincial Board of
Education. Last year the different
departments of the night school
were sponsored by several service
organizations of the town. A brave
enterprise, initiated with enthu-
siasm, carried on with zeal, but
not advanced much beyond the ex-
perimental stage. It is difficult to
maintain educational activity in-
definitely by means of the largess
of service clubs. In giving the
movement its first impetus, the
clubs have done a preliminary job
which reflects credit on their ini-
tiative. But now that our govern-
ment has recognized the project as
an integral part of Prince Edward
Island's educational program, it is
on more solid ground, and should
go on to greater achievement.
Much of the credit must go to the
High School supervisor, Clarence
Mercer, for it was he who carried
the idea in his head before it
reached the stage of a noble ex-
periment.
