The passing of John Kenneth MacLeod on Thursday, April 9, removed another old and highly respected resident from the Long Creek Community, in which he had lived for the span of 83 years.

Mr. MacLeod although well beyond life's allotted span, was always in the best of health, and to within a week previous to his death was about with his usual vigor and happy personality. The dread influenza, however, struck suddenly and with attendant complications brought about his death within a few days.

Mr. MacLeod was the son of the late George and Anne Henderson MacLeod. Only one of six brothers, Alexander of Charlottetown, survive. The other members of his family predeceased him, namely: George Jr., Archie, Hector, Joseph, Thomas, Lizzie, and Maud. His wife Priscilla MacNeill passed away six years ago.

His contacts with friends and neighbors always left a glow of good will and friendliness.

His funeral from the Long Creek Baptist Church, of which he was a member, was largely attended. Rev. H. Mitton of the Charlottetown Baptist Church conducted the services.
