

Want Study Of Sewage Disposal Unit For S'side

The Summerside Board of Trade last evening expressed unanimous support of an investigation to make towards the installation of a sewerage disposal plant to eliminate the health hazard existing from dangerous pollution of Summerside waterfront and harbor waters by the present sewerage outlets.

The action by the board followed a lengthy discussion on the matter which began when Mr. Frank Arnett made an inquiry as to why the sewer pipes leading into the harbor at the west end of the town had not been extended into the channel waters.

He commented on the situation with reference to the outlet being

exposed at low tide and to children playing on the shore front in this vicinity, and of the odor and health hazard existing there.

Mr. Edgar Cannon, a member of the board, and chairman of the Water and Sewerage Committee of the Town Council, explained the sewer had, until recently, extended to the sea wall, and a 450-foot extension made this year, had not been anticipated in the town's estimated expenditures and had cost over \$4,000.

Mr. Cannon estimated that an additional \$8,000 would be required to extend the sewer outlet to the distance suggested.

Mr. Morley Bell, M. L. A., a member of the board, said he understood that the Provincial Department of Health considered pollution of Summerside harbor by sewerage to be a serious matter which has passed the danger point and is definitely a source of danger to the public health.

Commenting on recent large expenditures which the Town Council have been called on to make, Mr. Bell said that as an individual he is one of the largest tax payers in the town, but did not regret the pending tax increases because of the facilities provided through the increased town expenditures, but he felt that the expenditure on the recent sewer extension was wasted unless it eliminated the conditions which still exist.

Mr. Bell said that even an extension to channel waters would be only a stop-gap in the need for a sewerage disposal plant.

He said that although bathing was featured in Summerside tourist promotions there was no safe place for public bathing near the town, and referred to sewerage being carried by tidal waters along the harbor shore fronts, and of the unpleasant situations which result.

Mr. Bell expressed appreciation of the way in which the Town Council have attended to the welfare of the town, and urged an investigation by the Town Council into the possibility of a sewerage disposal plant.

Mr. Frank Arnett supported the opinions expressed by Mr. Bell and said that a sewerage disposal plant was the only real solution. He said he believed the council should give consideration to the installation of such a system which would clean up the health hazard existing and suggested the council begin with an investigation into the cost that would be involved.

He said that this should be done before money was spent on extending the present outlets in the harbor. In reference to the sewerage disposal plant he said, "eventually it has to come, and will be money well spent."

With present conditions there could be trouble at any time, he said, and "nothing is more important than the health of our citizens, and I feel that they (the citizens) will support the council on this matter."

POTATO TARIFF Dealing with an agricultural matter concerning an American tariff on Canadian potatoes, Mr. Allison Profit of Freetown was supported by Fred Bingham and Harry Linkletter in an inquiry into the reasons for apparent lack of information as to the reasons for the 37% cent duty on Canadian potatoes going into the United States with no similar duty on American potatoes coming into Canada.

While recognizing that this was part of an international tariff trade agreement they expressed the desire to know what specific concessions Canada was getting in return. He said that an examination of recent texts of these trade conventions had failed to reveal any reference whatsoever to a discussion of bulk potatoes, and they have been neglected or forgotten by Canada's representative to these meetings.

The original tariff on Canadian potatoes had been invoked several years ago, they said, and appeared that it would remain in force until the Canadian representative presented arguments for its removal.

After lengthy discussion it was decided to seek the co-operation of Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M. P., in arranging a meeting between himself and the executive and agricultural committees of the Board of Trade for the purpose of ascertaining the reasons for the American duty on Canadian potatoes as it relates to the lack of similar duty on potatoes shipped into Canada from United States, and on ways and means of providing the potato producers of this province with the answers to these and other related matters.

Science Aids In Study Of Bay Of Fundy Currents

HALIFAX, N. S., (Special) - Miniature floating radio stations are going to help Canadian and United States scientists study the currents of the Bay of Fundy.

Immediate results of the study will be to discover the drift of surface water so that fisheries scientists can determine the origin of herring stocks in the Bay. They hope eventually to be able to make long-range predictions of herring movements and abundance.

Scientists of Canada's Fisheries Research Board Biological Station at St. Andrews, N. B., the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Wood's Hole Oceanographic Institute are co-operating in the study which is of great importance to the large sardine and herring industry of the two countries.

This week the Canadian scientists will set adrift three "transponding" drift buoys in the region of Trinity Ledges and Lurcher Shoals in southwestern Nova Scotia. They will be allowed to drift in the Fundy currents for two weeks in the study which time they will be monitored by the Federal Department of Fisheries vessel "Hareng."
