Two New Courses
Are Added At
S'ide High School

Two new courses, a commercial course and a technical course will be added to the curriculum of the Summerside High School and Academy this fall. It has been learned. They are designed to prepare students for positions in business and the trades.

The commercial course will commence in the latter part of September. It will be a two-year course covering accounting, shorthand, typewriting, filing, commercial law, English, business arithmetic, penmanship, economics and French. Students seeking admission must have at least a Grade Ten certificate but the course may be accelerated for those having higher academic qualifications. Two suitable rooms have been constructed in the Summerside High School for the commercial classes. The names of the instructors will be announced at a later date. Prospective students can submit their names to the secretary of the School Board and the fee will be \$50.00 per year.

The technical course is more properly called a Grade Ten technical course and will commence on Tuesday, Sept. 6th and its purpose is to provide a more practical education for boys who do not wish to study the academical subjects and who are not looking forward to university entrance.

It will consist of practical mathematics, English, science, economics, and citizenship, drafting, agriculture, woodworking, sheet metal working. Fifty per cent of the time will be spent in the workshops.

This course is open to boys who have spent a year in Grade Nine and to certain boys on the Grade Eight level because of age and interest. It will be open as well, as far as accommodation will permit, to boys who have already left school.

There is no fee for this course and boys wishing to enter should make application in writing to the supervisor, Mr. Clarence Mercer. At the conclusion of the course a Grade Ten technical certificate will be granted.

Ayrshires
For Canada

TORONTO, Aug. 12—A shipment of pedigree Ayrshires, numbering seven females and five bulls, has left Glasgow for two of the breed's important strongholds overseas — Canada and the U. S. A.

The largest group, numbering five head and comprising four females and one bull, has been sent to the Canadian breeder, Miss E. Bompas, of Ottawa. The eldest of the females is the rising four-year-old cow, Auchinbrair Madie 28th, which came from Mr. David Wallace, Mr. Wallace also supplied the bull, Auchinbrair Battle Flame. Two three-year-old heifers are included in the shipment to Miss Bompas. They are Pennysadzech Brown Rose, from Mr. John J. Caldwell, of Cumnock, and Stan-nock Marble 4th, which Mr. Ivie M. McIlwraith has sent. Miss Bompas also bought the two-year-old heifer, Lassnessock May Morning 23rd from Messrs. A. W. Montgomerie and Sons, that was fourth at the Royal Highland and Ayr shows this year.

Others in this draft were the 10-month-old bull, Burton Kabul, from Messrs. W. and J. Logan, and a three-year-old heifer, Tiquihillie Countess, from Major Sholto Douglas. Messrs. R. R. Ness and Sons of Quebec, have secured an attractive quartette, consisting of two bulls and two females. Of the two bulls, one, Barweys You Know, comes from Messrs. Alex Woodburn and Sons, the other, from Messrs. G. and N. Templeton, is Carnell Top-score.

Both the heifers which have gone to Messrs. Ness are from the herd of Mr. James T. Caldwell, being the rising two-year-old, Fast Raws Harebell, that was first at Ayr and Catrine shows this year, and Dainty Dinah. Fifth bull to be shipped was Knockallan Sunrise, sent by Mr. Robert Dunlop to Mr. Frank Harding, Chicago.

Large Whites For Canada

Four pedigree Large White hogs from the Rockwood herd owned by Messrs. M. Desmole and Sons, Mill Green, Spalding, were sold to overseas buyers last week for 1,700 gs. (\$5497). Two of the pigs made 500 gs. (\$1617) each, another 400 gs. (\$1293), and the fourth 300 gs. (\$970).

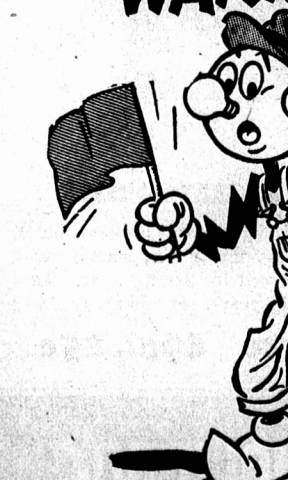
The pigs were sold after inspection to representatives of the Manitoba Cattle Breeders' Association. The 500 gs. paid for Rockwood

Livestock Export Group, thus showing a substantial increase in exports. During the same period last year, 80 head were also shipped to South Africa and, even if this figure is taken into consideration, figures denote that exports have been maintained at a similar level. 50 head of livestock passed through quarantine, during the quarter ended June 30, to Canada and the U. S. A. Direct shipments of livestock to Canada and the U. S. A. were 115. In addition, a quarantine period for 52 head of stock for shipment to the Republic of Ireland is now in progress and a shipment to Canada and the U. S. A. of 68 head has recently taken place. Over 100 head of livestock still remains to be shipped to Canada and the U. S. A. through quarantine, apart from orders shipped direct.
