

# Intermediate Abbies Win Third Straight By Defeating Juniors 8-5

The Intermediate Abbies won their third straight game of the Island Baseball League by defeating the Junior Abbies 8-5 last night but the victory may have been a costly one as Intermediate pitching and batting star Jack Reedy injured his left elbow during the last of the ninth inning.

Reedy, who relieved Cyril Smith in the second inning, pitched gilded ball for almost seven innings before something snapped in his throating elbow and he was forced to retire from the game. He left with one out in the ninth and two strikes on Forbes Kennedy. "Buck" Whitlock succeeded Reedy and retired the side.

The Juniors were leading 4-2 when Reedy and pitched two-hit ball the rest of the way. He also helped his own cause at the plate by banging out a tremendous triple to score the tying run in the eighth inning and later scored the winning run on Whitlock's single.

But the performance of Reedy was nearly overshadowed by the pitching of his rival mound artist Ian Kennedy. The 17-year-old Kennedy held the big bats of the Intermediates in check all the way down to the eighth inning when he was tired and the Intermediates got to him.

He pitched brilliant ball during the middle innings in one stretch he retired 14 men in a row before sending a batter to first by hitting him. Kennedy struck out eight men and in the second inning he whiffed every batter he faced.

Forbes Kennedy led all batters with three hits in five trips to the plate. Duck MacLeod had two hits in three trips and Jack Reedy two hits in four.

Joe Coyle, Don MacLeod, Forbes Kennedy, Jack Cairns and Reedy all batted out triples during the well played contest. MacLeod also hit a double to win slugging honors for the evening.

Charlie Kennedy pulled off the best fielding play of the game when he made a one-handed throw off David MacLeod in the sixth inning. Jackie Cairns played a

very strong game at second for the intermediates, having four putouts and two assists.

The Intermediates were handled by Danny MacCormack, who was forced into the lineup himself in the last of the ninth as the result of Reedy's injury. Joey LeClair managed the juniors in the absence of Tom MacFarlane.

The game got underway at 7:30 and the lights were turned on at 8:15. The contest concluded about 10:15.

# Yankees Run Winning Streak To Seven Games

New York Yankees ran their winning streak in the American League to seven games Thursday although they had to go into an extra inning to turn back Chicago White Sox 9-5.

In the National League Brooklyn Dodgers finally solved Milwaukee Braves after two straight whippings but the Braves held on to the league lead by half a game. The score was 10-5.

Pittsburgh defeated Chicago 6-1 in a game in which you needed more than a scoreboard to identify the players. The clubs swapped 10 men—headed by Ralph Kiner—an hour before game time.

New York Giants turned in a duplicate of Wednesday's ball game against Cincinnati, winning by the same score of 7-3.

Larry Doby hit a grand slam home run in Cleveland's 8-1 victory over Boston Red Sox, a verdict that kept the Indians 1-2 games behind the league-leading Yankees.

Cass Michaels, a light-hitting second baseman, summed a three-run homer in the 10th inning to give Philadelphia Athletics a 9-6 victory over Detroit Tigers and a clean sweep of a doubleheader.

The A's piled up 16 hits to take the opened 11-2 behind Mario Ericano's seven-hit hurling.

The Yankees caught by the Sox in the eighth inning when Allie Reynolds yielded his first runs in relief in two seasons, exploded for four tallies in the 10th. Reynolds

got credit for the victory. Gil McDougald homered with a man on base and the New Yorkers pushed two more across on three walks and a Chicago error.

The Dodgers used four homers and 10 bases on balls to subdue the Braves who had come from behind twice in two days to win. Milwaukee staged another late rally Thursday, scoring three times in the eighth but the Brooklyn lead was too much. Max Surkont was charged with his first loss since Sept. 19. The Dodgers beat him that day, too.

Mel Parnell of Boston, who had lost six in a row to Cleveland, tried and failed again against the Indians. He lasted only into the second inning. Doby's bases-loaded blast came off Bill Kennedy in the fifth.

Nash Of Home Runs  
 The Giants hit five home runs and the Red Legs hit three at the Polo Grounds. The big New York margin was accumulated in the eighth when a walk and seven hits including a two-on out by catcher Ray Noble produced seven runs.

Philadelphia made 29 hits including five homers during its twin bill with Detroit to extend its winless streak to 12 games. The Tigers have lost 10 times in their last dozen starts.

In addition to Michaels, Eddie Joost hit two homers for the A's while Dave Philley and Gus Zernial hit one each. Zernial's homer—his 12th of the season—tied him for the American League lead with Cleveland's Al Rosen.

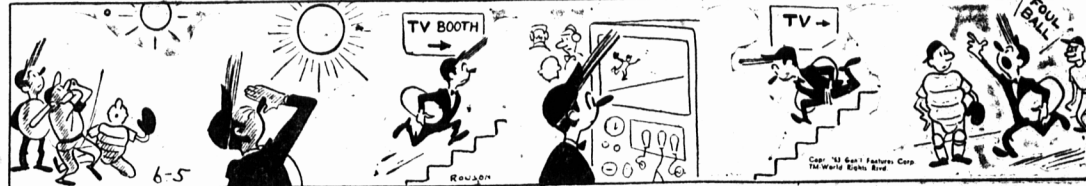

# Chicago Cubs Obtain Kiner In Spectacular Deal With Pittsburgh

 PITTSBURGH, (AP) — Chicago Cubs happily grabbed home-run king Ralph Kiner from Pittsburgh Pirates Thursday in one of baseball history's most spectacular deals involving 10 players.

Master trader Branch Rickey gave up Kiner and three others for six players and a bundle of cash. He declined to give the cash figure but it is reported to be in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

It's one of the few trades in which a big league club has let go its star player while he was still at the peak of his career.

But Rickey has a long record of trading players he thinks are past their prime.

Kiner, whose salary of \$75,000 is second only to Stan Musial of St. Louis Cardinals, recently became the 12th player in history to hit 300 home runs. He has seven this season.

Not a Surprise  
 "It didn't come as a surprise," the big outfielder said after changing to a Cub uniform before Thursday's game. "I'm sorry to leave Pittsburgh because it was my home."

Manager Phil Cavaratta of the Cubs was elated over the transaction.

"I'm sure glad to get Kiner," he beamed. "This will give us a good one-two punch with Hank Sauer. This is something the Cubs needed for a long time."

Going to the Cubs along with Kiner are catcher Joe Garagiola, pitcher Howie Pollet and outfielder-infielder George Metkovich.

### What Pirates Get

Changing to Pirate uniforms are pitcher Bob Schultz, catcher Toby Atwell and outfielders Gene Hermanski, Preston Ward and Bob Addis.

The Cubs also get the option to purchase infielder George Freese from Springfield in the International League, for fall delivery.

Trade winds had been blowing hot for some time with the 30-year-old Kiner apparently on the block since his holdout fight with Rickey last spring when Ralph finally took a pay cut from \$90,000 after an off-season last year.

"We both feel we have strengthened our clubs," said Rickey. "That was the main objective of the deal."

His only disclosure on the maneuvers involved was that it all hinged on Ward. The 25-year-old outfielder, who went to first base in a Pirate uniform, currently is hitting .230.

A Cubs spokesman said they did not want a fixture in left field for the Pirates since 1946, leading or tying his league in the homer department every year since. Not even Babe Ruth could claim such an accomplishment.
