

New N.B. Agreement Cuts Rail Freight On Potatoes

MILVILLE, N. B. (CP) — A new freight rate arrangement affecting the movement of Central Brunswick potatoes to Central Canada will go into effect within the next few weeks, the president of the New Brunswick Potato Shippers Association, H. C. Greenlaw, announced here Monday night.

The new arrangements, known as an agreed charge, will result in considerable reductions in the potato freight rates. For instance, a decrease of two cents per 100 pounds will be made on the movement from Grand Falls to Montreal, while the rates to Toronto will come down by three cents.

The announcement followed weeks of negotiations with the railways. The agreed charges, under which 85 per cent of the New Brunswick potato movement will be shipped by rail, will mean considerable savings for the potato producers of the province.

To the railways it assures a stable movement of the crop to the major consumer markets.

At Fredericton, Premier Hugh John Flemming commended the joint efforts of the Maritimes Transportation Commission, the Canadian National Railway, the New Brunswick Potato Shippers Association in negotiating a better deal for potato shippers in the province.

Let's Talk It Over

It comes as somewhat of a shock to learn that Russia sends an average of 19.6 students per thousand of population to university, compared with Canada's 4.7. Perhaps this should not be so surprising. Education has always appeared in the role of "poor relation" in our economic set-up. The profits derived from the educational industry are much less obvious than is the case with most industries. When an industry can show a profit of say \$50,000 per year, even if the way it makes that profit can't be explained, it is considered a success. The old cliché "money talks" is true, but not strong enough. Money shouts in the ears of the nation, and it is difficult to turn a deaf ear to it. The rewards of education are much more subtle. What is there to show for a year's effort in the educational field? Better training for our citizens of the future. It is difficult to place this profit on a balance sheet so that everyone can properly assess it.

Federal aid for education is one of the pressing needs today. Everyone seems to agree that such aid would be a great boon to our educational program. We haven't heard a dissenting voice insofar as this phase of the problem is concerned. But there are technicalities in the way. Something has to be done with provincial rights. But one of the most compelling of provincial rights is the right to educate its people in a satisfactory way. Surely such a technical barrier is not going to stand in the way of educational progress. Would you hesitate to save a child from the attack of a bull in a field just because there was a "no trespassing" sign on the fence?

Reconsider 24 Jets For Israel

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian government is reconsidering an order permitting the sale of 24 Canadian-built Sabre jets to Israel, it was announced here Monday night.

The external affairs department announced that the sale is being reviewed following reports from the Middle East that Israeli troops have invaded Egypt. It said no planes have left Canada as yet for Israel.

The announcement said: "The situation is that of these aircraft has as yet left Canada. In view of the recent developments in Palestine, the question of permitting these aircraft to go forward is under review."

Delivery of the jets will hinge on whether the Canadian government regards Israel's reported invasion of Egypt as an act of aggression.

CANSTOP SHIPMENT

An official of the external affairs department Monday recalled Prime Minister St. Laurent and External Affairs Minister Pearson have said several times that the shipments could be stopped if tension between Arab countries and Israel worsened.

However, he said the government has not received sufficient information on the new Middle Eastern developments to make an appraisal of what is happening. The government would not comment.

HARVESTING BEANS ON FARM NEAR ALBERTON

The work of harvesting fifty acres of beans is going ahead from daylight to dark on the farm of Erskine Clark near Alberton. A new crop for the western part of the Island, the beans stalks are first cut off close to the ground by a two-row harvester (left) from where they are picked up by a combine (shown above right) equipped with a bean threshing attachment. Harvesting was speeded up considerably by use of a side delivery rake to bring six rows of beans into a single windrow for combining. Although not considered a good year for beans, Mr. Clark reports he is well satisfied with the yield which will be shipped to St. Stephen, N.B. for processing.

AMMAN, Jordan (Reuters)—King Hussein Monday approved the formation of an anti-Western government containing the first acknowledged Communist supporter even to achieve cabinet rank in the Arab world.

Sulman Nabulsi, leader of the National Socialist party and admirer of Egyptian President Nasser, heads the new coalition cabinet.

His agriculture minister is Abdul Qaleh As-Saleh, a member of the National Bloc and an acknowledged Communist supporter.

Nabulsi's party advocates abrogation of Jordan's defence and federation with Syria and eventual union with Egypt.

Hussein's approval of the new cabinet followed parliamentary elections eight days ago in which the National Socialists, formerly the Opposition party, scored sweeping gains. A majority of members of the new 40-member parliament campaigned for abrogation of the 1948 treaty with Britain and closer ties with Egypt.

interest of young people, and improving the general returns to agriculture. This plan called for hand selection of enough heads of grain to sow 1/4 acre.

The second year a similar number of heads were chosen from the quarter acre to again sow a seed plot of 1/4 acre, and the same again the third year. About 1,500 young persons entered and 450 finished the three-year undertaking. It is recorded that at the end of the third year this selection had resulted in a 40 per cent increase in the yield per acre of wheat and a 36 per cent increase in the yield of oats, while the weight per 100 heads had increased by 28 per cent and 27 per cent respectively.

In the following year, on June 15, 1904, the Canadian Seed Growers' Association was formed. From this modest beginning, Registered Seed is today grown from coast to coast over a quarter of a million acres and rape, alfalfa, red clover, alsike, sweet clover, a half dozen species of grasses, tobacco, mangels, swedes and most of the common vegetable crops.

SURVIVOR

Gordon MacMillan was one of the original MacDonald-Robertson junior competitors. I am not aware of any others of that early group who are living. He had grown registered crops of cereals, swedes and mangels, and during the years when he served as inspector of the Plant Products Division, he supervised the production of these crops in the Island province.

During two wars he served

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actively on our seed committees. Between the two wars, when bent coes was in heavy demand, it was Gordon MacMillan whose skill and ingenuity transformed this previously worthless crop into a source of real money. On occasions too numerous to mention, to Gordon has fallen the job of cleaning difficult lots of vegetable seed that would otherwise have been unsalable.

Among other surroundings one might link Gordon's name with foxes, with speedy horses, with two fine sons who are farming beside him, and with the male quartettes where his leadership and lusty second bass continue to give pleasure and inspiration to old and young.

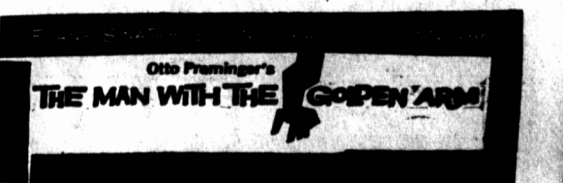
