LOBSTER FISHING.—The Inspector of Fisheries informs us that no extension of the legal time of lobster-fishing will be granted this year. Parties interested had therefore better govern themselves accordingly.

THE match game of cricket between the American eleven and the Gentlemen of Liverpool, begun Monday, was resumed Tuesday. The Gentlemen of Liverpool completed their first inning with a score of 169 runs. The Philadelphia team in the second inning made 102. The game then stood 287 to 169 in favor of the Americans. The Liverpool team scored 114 runs in the second inning, after an exciting contest, the Americans thus winning the game by four runs. The result was mainly due to Lowery's bowling and the good fielding of the Americans.

The long threatened struggle between the houses of Lords and Commons has become an actual reality, and the result will be watched with great anxiety on this side of the Atlantic as well as in the mother country. History repeats itself, for in 1832 Earl Grey, who was then prime minister of England, was met with the same opposition by the House of Lords on the passage of the great Reform Bill. On that occasion the Upper House only gave way on a threat to create a sufficient number of Whig peers to secure the passage of a bill through the House. Earl Grey's courage and firmness on that occasion, most probably, saved England from a civil war.

The new locomotive, No. 7, went as far as Alberton, yesterday, on a trial trip, and we are glad to learn that the officials in charge were highly pleased with her performance. At times a speed of thirty-eight miles per hour was reached, with ease. Eighty-seven miles were run without stopping for either fuel or water. The specification from which this fine engine has been built was prepared by the Mechanical Superintendent, J. Unsworth, Esq. In appearance she is handsome, and the workmanship reflects great credit on her builders—the Canadian Locomotive and Engine Company of Kingston, Ontario. The best material has been used in her construction, and it is stated that she is second to none as a narrow-gauge engine.

On Thursday evening, in answer to Mr. Cairne, Sir Charles Dilke said: The number of pauper children sent to Canada by Boards of Guardians during the season from May to August last year, was 130, of whom 37 were from metropolitan and 93 from country unions. No official reports of the inspection of the children by the officers of the Dominion Government had as yet been communicated with the Secretary of State for the Colonies with the view of being furnished with such reports. It is proposed for the present to continue the emigration of pauper children to Canada within certain limits. With regard to the age of the children the Board has stated that as a general rule girls should not be sent out above the age of ten years, and in no case, except under very exceptional circumstances, above the age of twelve years.

The Marine and Fisheries Department has come to the conclusion that the millions of dead fish now floating on Lake Ontario are young shad hatched at Seth Green's fish breeding establishment at Rochester, N. Y., and placed in the streams tributary to the Lake. It is also believed that the falling off in the catch of whitefish in Lake Ontario is due to the poisoning of the water by the dead shad. Representations will probably be made to the United States Government respecting this matter. Seth Green, however, emphatically denies that the millions of dead fish now floating on Lake Ontario are shad. He says they are a kind of fish known as alewives, but of the shad species. The shad he placed in the lake do not die. He accounts for the scarcity of whitefish by saying it is due to continued overfishing with pound nets and not to poisoning.

CAPT. JOHN TRAYNOR, aged 27, two years married, and a sailor by occupation, started on his long cruise across the Atlantic Ocean, on the 6th inst., at five o'clock, from the house of the New Haven Yacht Club, in his seventeen foot dory, Harold T. Bibber. His sole companion will be an ordinary-looking dog answering to the name of Jumbo. He was towed out into the Sound by one of the New Haven club yachts, and thinks he can make the trip in one hundred days. He has provisions enough to last him and his dog six months. He would have gone a week ago, but the Centennial Committee wanted him to appear in the procession on that day, and he consented. His motive for crossing in the hazardous manner, relying only upon oars, is to show the superior quality of his dory as a life-boat. He intends to exhibit it in England and on the Continent. He will stop at New London for a chart of the Atlantic, being unable to obtain one in New Haven, Conn.

HARDEN HAND GRENADE.—Last evening, at eight o'clock, a second exhibition of the Harden Hand Grenade, was given on the Market Square, supervised by Chief Engineer Lange and the local agent, Mr. Theo. L. Chappelle. The fire was more than double the size of the former, and much more intense. At sharp eight the agent and Mr. F. H. Beer lighted the shavings, which, with the wood kindling, was drenched with oil, the flames immediately shooting up to a distance of fully fifteen feet. After the fire had made good headway, the order was given to use the Grenades, and one bottle was thrown which did good work. Another followed, but slid off from the tar which was heavily coated on the back of the organ box used for the experiment. A third was quickly used and completely subdued the fire. The effect was instantaneous. This fire extinguisher should be at once procured by every household, and especially placed in all our factories and shops where combustible materials abound.
