In his annual report as president of the Summerside Board, Mr. Hubley noted that the banquet menu was composed of Island products which were among the finest in the world. He said that when consumers buy Island products they buy the best quality available and at the same time help local agriculture producers and manufacturers to create additional employment.

He referred to the fire loss in the town early last year and the resulting replacement construction. He commented also on the Hillcrest housing project as a tremendous asset to the business firms and the town in general. He said it should result in more than the minimum delivery points required for street mail delivery in Summerside.

Referring to the tourist industry he said that if transportation was adequate it would be the largest industry. Noting the Summerside Board of Trade's opinion that the ground floor of the light house tourist bureau at Albany is too small to be adequate at a provincial tourist information office, he recalled that the board had also pointed out the advantages of retaining tourist information girls on the car ferries. He said the Summerside Board's tourist bureau at Read's Corner had rendered a very necessary service and this should be maintained for Summerside and West Prince.

He noted the police co-operation with the board in improving traffic conditions at peak periods and that the blowing of car horns had been reduced to a minimum.

MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING

President Hubley, speaking in regard to the agricultural committee, commented on their splendid attendance at board meetings, which brought together producer and business men, giving them the opportunity to become better acquainted and to discuss each others problems with mutual understanding.

He referred to the success of the Summerside Lobster Carnival stating that it has done more to advertise Summerside and the Island than other equal amounts.

spent through the means of advertising, and he urged members to join in making a success of the 1959 carnival.

A large addition to the shed on Marine Wharf was noted by President Hubley, providing better shipping facilities for shippers and producer.

With this wharf also completely paved during the year many trucking problems were eliminated. Other projects of interest to the board were the completion of paving between the Red Bridge and Summerside; the extension of Central Street and highway between St. Eleanor's.

He said the board has been informed that the Sherbrooke Road to Traveller's Rest will be paved next spring, and that the George MacKay, minister of highways, has assured that the necessary work at Sherbrooke Corner will be done to round out the turn both ways.

BOARD CONCERNED

He referred to the concern and action of the board in the matter of transportation facilities between the Island and the mainland, and also in regard to freight rate increase.

President Hubley had praise for the work of Lester Jenkins and John Wright, two board members who are directors of APEC who carried out a membership drive for this organization in which they increased the membership by 80 for a total of 91 in Prince County. Mr. Wright, a past president of the Summerside Board of Trade, was appointed vice-president for P.E.I. at the annual APEC meeting.

The report last night also noted that Frank Arnett, was the delegate for the Summerside Board of Trade at the 29th annual convention of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in Montreal this year.

The report for the marine and transportation committee was made by committee chairman Fred Bingham who said that the completion this year of the wharf project at the Marine Wharf and the erection of the new addition to the east shed have placed facilities at the disposal of the exporters that should help greatly in increasing export trade in almost any product.

All sheds are now heated which gives frost-proof protection under normal conditions and he said that no one can estimate the amount of potatoes saved from freezing as a result.

TO INSTALL LIGHTS

This spring, he said, powerful floodlights are to be installed to facilitate in night loading of cargoes. Racks are also going to be built in the older sheds to provide airspace for proper ventilation similar to those in the shed just completed.

Tenders are now being called for extensive repairs to the Fishermen's Wharf at Holmans. He said the board had been asked to request a small inspection shed to be located some distance up the Marine Wharf.

Mr. Binkham presented the following details of loading for the past season together with approximate wages paid:

Eight large and nine small potato boats, three pulpwood, one small molasses boat, and one small flour boat. Cargoes landed at Summerside included 9,500 tons of fertilizer; 167 tons of molasses; 139 tons of flour.

Cargoes shipped from Summerside included 743,000 bushels of seed and tablestock potatoes;

Brief highlights from these included the sick and visiting committee report, of which Dick Steele was chairman. This showed that 60,000 cigarettes at a cost of \$13,000 had been distributed by the branch to veterans in hospitals and those sick at home. The report stated that 1,000 calls, or an average of 20 per week were made by this active committee.

From the relief committee report for the year it was shown the branch spent \$1769 on relief with \$699 of this on Christmas food parcels for veterans and their families.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions passed at last night's meeting, which was attended by about 150 members, were that the branch borrow \$50,000 on the best possible terms to be used to finance the new legion home which will be constructed on Notre Dame Street at a cost of approximately \$100,000. Also that the present legion home be offered for sale by tender with occupancy to take place on completion of the new home.

President Trainor thanked the members for the honor and privilege bestowed on him and expressed his appreciation for the three special meetings during the year, and that membership of the Summerside Board included 51 individual members and 31 firms.

Other reports included those of the tourist and publicity committee by George T. Clark, in which it was noted that a record 11,000 visitors registered at the Read's Corner tourist bureau sponsored by the Summerside Board; the report of the civic affairs committee by J. Frank Arnett; the retail merchants committee by Roy Boates and the agricultural committee by William Cairns.

INDUSTRIAL COMMITTEE

The report of the industrial development committee by chairman John S. Wright noted that agriculture is the most important industry in this part of the province and Summerside's industrial life is closely allied with it.

He said the Island has been backward in the past in showing the consuming public that local products are of the best quality available. He said that at the Atlantic Provinces food show even those who should have known were impressed and surprised by the variety of products exhibited, the modern packaging and high grade of excellence of the articles shown. Three Summerside firms were represented and their displays were rated very highly.

The report of the membership and entertainment committee by chairman Roy Johnston noted the board had held eight regular and

Detailed reports on the year's activities were given by the various committee chairmen, all of which indicated a most successful year.

The installation ceremony was conducted by R. L. Mollison and Rollie Phillipson and included the president, vice-presidents, Mercer Mullin, Leo Blacquire, Secretary-Manager James Hogan, members of the executive, and sergeant-at-arms, Ralph Boates.

At the formal opening of Parliament, Raymond Wong of Antigonish was elected Speaker. The Lieutenant Governor, Dr. William Crawford, dean of Science at Mount Allison University read the speech from the Throne.

Among the more important resolutions was one introduced by Garth Caseley of Kensington and seconded by Alfred Zwicker. It read, "Resolved that we, as members of the 36th Maritime Tuxis and Older Boys Parliament go on record as advocating that capital punishment be abolished in Canada."

Mr. Caseley pointed out that

capital punishment was abolished in Britain and there had been no evidence to indicate an upsurge in crime there". One of those speaking in favor of the resolution was Errol Sharpe of Kensington; who quoted Christ's words from St. Matthew's gospel, "You should forgive a man seventy times seven".

A resolution on prayer moved by Winston Parkhill and seconded by Vernon Bowes, resolved "that we will carry out personal daily devotions, and that we will encourage others, especially young people to do likewise." Errol Sharpe, Kensington, speaking on a resolution urging members to promote missionary activity abroad, said Trinidad should be taken as an example.

Guinness Maharaj, delegate from Trinidad, who is a student at Dalhousie University, told of missionary work in his country who had established schools, set an example of "the true spirit of Christianity in youth", and established a theological college.

A resolution regarding smoking, moved by Barry Walsh and seconded by Len Draw, read, "Resolved that we as members of the 36th Tuxis and Older Boys Parliament, give careful study to the effects of the use of tobacco, and as Christian Youth, set an example to discourage smoking."

A resolution regarding dancing in church halls was moved by Robert Monroe and seconded by Emerson Davis, resolved "that the members go on record as favoring dancing in church halls, provided that it is well supervised, and non-commercialized."

Greetings were extended to the Parliamentarians from the youth of Bermuda, by Reginald Ming who is Youth Advisor for the Government of Bermuda and attended the sessions to get ideas for youth work in his own country.

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
