200 Blood Donors Sought In Souris

Wednesday will be "Blood Donor Day" in Eastern King's County when at least 200 donors will be sought by members of the Royal Canadian Legion branches at Morell and Souris who are sponsoring these clinics.

Joseph Walsh who resides at Green Meadows is the newly appointed chairman for the Morell clinic which will again be held at the Legion Home there. Mr. Walsh reports that members of his committee are busy engaged in a canvass for all available donors in the districts surrounding Morell, and that he is hopeful of reaching the 150 objective between 3 and 5 that afternoon.

Members of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Morell-Legion will also play an active part in the preparations for the clinic at which they will be furnishing the refreshments and the volunteers to assist with the various duties in connection with the clinic.

Souris Legion Home, which is presently being used daily as the central spot for the Souris Day Camp in which some 500 children from the region are involved in the Red Cross water safety program, will be converted into a Blood Donor Clinic on Wednesday evening, August 10th between 8 and 10 o'clock.

Marcus A. Mooney who holds the distinction of being the "champion" blood donor chairman for the past two years when the Souris area has been the winner of the "Manning Trophy" for achieving the highest percentage of donor enrollment on quota in the province, is leaving no stone unturned to retain the trophy for the third successive year.

In order to do this Souris must exceed the 126.5 per cent result attained in Charlottetown in his past spring's clinic. This is the best response to date, and outdoes his 122 per cent record established by Souris last year when 184 registered on the 150 objective.

Richard Wilson Is Expected Here

Richard D. Wilson, well-known Montreal artist, is expected to arrive in Charlottetown next week to prepare a series of drawings for the Bank of Montreal's Canada Centennial Tableau.

His project was designed to mark the Centennial of Confederation and the bank's 150th anniversary. In 1967, Mr. Wilson will make on-the-spot sketches in the Charlottetown area with an objective to produce a tableau of contemporary Canadian scenes during the period leading up to 1967.

He is visiting communities in all parts of the country, regardless of size and population. It is a full-time operation and he expects to have a few hundred black and white sketches, done on location, when he is through.

Mr. Wilson is known through publication of the best-selling book, "Living past Montreal", and a portfolio of quality prints of his drawings, both by the McGill University Press.

He specializes in sketching buildings and scenes with historical interest, setting up his easel on location and completing all drawings on the spot. The speed with which he completes
