Presentation To Valiant Island Priest

The presentation was made yesterday morning following the celebration of a Solemn High Mass in St. Augustine's Church by Father Pineau. He was assisted by Rev. Francis Bolger (right) and Rev. J. Clarence Pitre (left) parish priest at South Rustico.

Mr. Howard Gallant is pictured making the presentation on behalf of the parishoners. A French address was read to Father Pineau by Mr. Edward Blanchard and an English address by Mr. Frank J. Doucette.

On the conclusion of the ceremony Father Pineau who has spent the last eighteen years in China, spoke briefly in French and English.

The Missionary, who spent several years in Communist prison camps near Suchow, China, did not refer to his own experiences as a prisoner of the religion-hating Reds. Rather, he thanked the Island people for their generosity and asked their prayers for China.

"I thank you very sincerely for this address and this purse," commenced Father Pineau. "I do not deserve the beautiful things you have said about me but I know that you have put your heart into this address which I appreciate very much."

"I wish to thank you for your generosity in the past and your prayers for the Missions and I would like to ask you for more prayers for China. If you could see the religious persecution in China and the heroic resistance of the Chinese Catholics it would be an inspiration for you. If you could see the priests in jail with irons on their hands and feet you would pray for them day and night."

Although I have been expelled from China by the Communists for ever it is still my country and some day I hope to return. I want you to pray every day for China. I fail to get these prayers. I will feel that my trip to the Island has been a failure," he concluded.

Yesterday evening Father Pineau met with the parishoners in the parish hall and conducted a conference on the Communists persecutions in China.

The South Rustico choir, under the capable direction of Mr. Edward Blanchard, sang the Mass in a very capable manner.

Following is the text of the address: Reverend and Dear Father: Magnificat anima mea. For many weeks this little parish of Rustico has been awaiting your arrival and joy fills the heart of every one that the hour of meeting has at last arrived. We thank you for your visit to our island, for allowing, in His Divine Providence, your safe return to our midst. At times, we have thought that your home-coming was only a dream and that the enemies of your good work, so keen to frustrate your priestly influence would also frustrate our hopes. But we rejoice in the Lord that He has permitted your deliverance and brought you safely home to us.

Dear Reverend Father, we are justly proud of your apostolic work and we greatly appreciate the privilege and the honor of having had one of our sons devote himself so zealously in the missionary field of China. Indeed we know that your life with the Chinese people has been one of many hardships and difficulties. Normally speaking, to leave home and country, to learn a strange language, to adapt oneself to the ways and manners of a new race, requires a character with the greatest courage. But to have to meet with innumerable misunderstandings, with sufferings of all kinds and often times even with hunger, to do all this for the greater glory of God and for the extension of His Kingdom, is indeed worthy of the greatest praise.

We realize, dear Father, that your love for the welfare of your adopted people has made these trials seem slight and that your greatest desire is to return to their support. Nevertheless, our admiration of the courage and perseverance you have manifested has edified us and has stimulated us to live our christian life with more fervor.

Often our beloved pastor, Reverend Father Pitre, has reminded us to pray for those behind the Iron Curtain and those under arrest and consequently you had a great share of our prayers and aims.
