

Bob Shaw Hopes Pushups Will Help Lift Wins To 20

NEW YORK (AP)—Bob Shaw, the Chicago White Sox pitcher who thrives on exercise, milk and American League batsmen, is back home doing pushups. He says they'll help lift his victory total to 20 next season.

Shaw, an 18-game winner this year, Tuesday was named the pitcher of the year in the annual Associated Press poll.

The 23-year-old bachelor from Garden City, N.Y., leaves for Chicago next week to work with the White Sox promotional department, touring the banquet circuit and making speeches.

STARTS CONDITIONING
In Chicago, Shaw says, he will join an athletic club. Shaw needs a gymnasium as much as he needs a right arm. Although the world series ended less than three weeks ago, Shaw already has begun his conditioning program for the 1959 season.

"I don't think I lost a game when I had a lead in the late innings last year," said Shaw, who dropped only six all total.

"I go out there thinking that I have the advantage over the other pitcher in condition," Shaw said. "I've tried to break down every move in the pitching motion and correspondingly develop a muscle which takes part in that

motion. I do pushups, flip metal dishes, swing Indian clubs and I swim almost every day. Swimming keeps the muscles toned up in the shoulder area."

WATCHES DIET
Shaw also watches his diet carefully. "I've eliminated all candy, pas-

tries and other desserts. I go for fresh vegetables, fruit, meat and fish. I drink more than a quart of milk every day."

Shaw is a 6-2, 195 pounder. He has a 41 inch chest and a 33 inch waist. He doesn't know his biceps' measurements, but they're impressive. That's for sure.

Virgil Akins, Lane Battle Tonight

WASHINGTON (AP)—Virgil Akins, who wants the welterweight boxing title back, and Kenny Lane, who wants any title he can get, meet here today in a nationally televised 10-rounder.

Lane, the Muskegon, Mich., southpaw, was an early favorite at prices going up to 9-5. Kenny probably attained that position of Akins' recent appearances, rather than his own.

Virgil has been less than spectacular since losing his 147-pound championship to Don Jordan last December. He needs a victory

over an established fighter to justify his rights to another title match.

Lane lost his last engagement when Carlos Ortiz opened a gash on his forehead in a bout for the junior welterweight crown four months ago. Lane previously had outpointed Ortiz, but that wound forced him out on a second round TKO.

Although co-manager Jack Kearns rates Lane a natural lightweight, Kenny is now bidding for a chance at Jordan, Ortiz or Joe Brown, king of the lights.

The 19-year-old Cape Breton schoolboy opened a deep cut over his older opponent's left eye in the eighth round. Referee Jack Delaney halted the fight at 2:48 of the round with Fiddler's face a mass of blood.

Cus D'Amato Gets Hearing Next Week

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Athletic Commission has scheduled hearings next week for principals who were wrangled recently for their roles in the Ingemar Johansson-Floyd Patterson heavyweight title fight.

Gen. Melvin Krulwich, commission chairman, Tuesday set Nov. 5 as the date for a hearing in the case of Cus D'Amato, Patterson's manager.

D'Amato, who declined previously to appear before the commission, has been asked to show cause why his license as a manager and second should not be suspended.

Similar hearings have been set for Nov. 6 for William P. Rosensohn, promoter of the fight, and officials of Rosensohn Enterprises, with whom Rosensohn later broke.

As usual, we expect to see quite a few Maritimers make the visit to Harrisburg, and they will probably return with several speed prospects for 1960. The latest issue of "The Harness Horse" is packed with advertisements of horses that will be sold at Harrisburg, and according to the ads they are expected to race even better in 1960 than they did this season.

One of the good consignments that we notice is from the Clearview Stable, owned by Norman Woolworth, one of the proprietors of the five-and-ten-cent store chain. They have all been trained and given their records by ex-Maritimer Earl Avery. Here they are: Ebony Bay, p. 3, 2,044; General Sampson, 2, 2,08; Sampson Hanover; Mr. Wonderful, 2, by Rodney, 4, 1,58 4-5; Charming Barbara, 4, 1,58 4-5; Gunga Din, 3, by Rodney; Billy boggan, a two-year-old bay filly by Tar Hell, a sister to Success Top, 3, 2,03 2-5; Geisha, a two-year-old bay filly by Goose Bay, dam Fedora Hanover, Ebonita, B 2,00, free-legged. Last year's consignments to the Harrisburg Stable consisted of seven young trotters and pacers, of which the following took new records: Bonny, 2, 2,04 2-5; O'Brien Hal, p. 2, 2,03 2-5; Red Top, 2,06 2-5; Paula Scott 2,08; Kiss Me Kate, p. 3, 2,08 2-5; Devil Diver, 3, 2,09 4-5; and Dynamite Direct p. 2, 2,05 2-5. All records, with the exception of the latter, were taken this year.

Following the Harrisburg sale will be the 12th annual Fall Speed Sale at Delaware, Ohio, on November 16, 17 and 18. Harvey Klink claims that he has never before received so many entries. This sale has been very popular with Maritimers in recent years, and during that time most of the racing material that has been brought to the Maritimes has come from the Delaware sale.

NEW RECORD
On the cover of the issue of "The Harness Horse" for October 21st is a photo-finish which shows Muncy Hanover, driven by Earl Avery, setting a new track record of 2:04 4/5 for two-year-old pacers at Arden Downs Raceway. This stake was worth \$14,265.

Our readers will remember that Earl won at Delaware, Ohio, with the same Muncy Hanover, and set up a new world's record for two-year-old pacers on a half-mile track. This was on the same afternoon as the running of the Little Brown Jug. The above track, Arden Downs, is located at Washington, Pennsylvania, and is a half-mile racing strip.

A list of the leading sires appears in a recent issue of "The Harness Horse," with the number of dashes their get won this year, in late October. They are: Adios, 469; King's Counsel, 437; Darnley, 370; Nibble Hanover, 365; Rodney, 359; Dean Hanover, 333; Knight Dream, 332; The Widower, 301; Ensign Hanover, 289; Victory Song, 239; Titan Hanover, 271; Worthy Boy, 265; High Volo, 256; Poplar Byrd, 249; Gene Abbe, 240.

The racing season started in California at Hollywood Park, Inglewood, on October 18, when Senator Frost, a son of Victor Song, established a new world's record for a mile and a sixteenth of 2:05 1/5 in winning the \$6,000 Long Beach Trot; the attendance was 18,115.

Joe O'Brien won the "B" Pace, purse \$2,200, with Duration, time 2:01 2-5, and he also won the "A" Pace, purse \$4,000, with Raider Frost in 2:00 3-5. There is a nice photo showing Mrs. Nellie Camp, with Mrs. Joe O'Brien, standing alongside of Joe, who is holding the reins over Raider Frost.

Hollywood Park would be an ideal spot to enjoy harness racing for the next three or four months.

A race fan, who is a late-nighter, caught the news from Hollywood on Saturday's racing and has very kindly informed us that Jamon won the first leg of the \$75,000 American Trotting Classic; as protection against

noise in the race, he was wearing pink ear-muffs. His time for the mile was 1:50 4-5.

Some of the horses that faced the French trotting champion in the above race were: Charming Barbara, Senator Frost and Darn Safe.

EXCITING BATTLE
At Sackville Downs last Saturday night the most exciting race on the program was in the third and seventh dashes. In the first of these, Bad News, owned and driven by Hazen Fletcher, finished in a dead heat for first with Stalag Hanover, driven by Emmet Bernard in 2:10 4-5. In the second time out, with the same field, Stalag Hanover went a bit rough and lost ground, but still finishes a close second to Bad News, time 2:09 4-5.

Bad News is a five-year-old by Jolly, a local sire, and last year he ended the season with a mark of 2:18 and winnings of \$538, our readers, will, like ourselves, consider this new mark a remarkable improvement. Stalag Hanover is owned by Alfred MacNeill of Charlottetown. Other results on the card were:

At Saint John Raceway Saturday night, the top performances were in races 4 and 8; Miss Abner T. (B. Queen) was 1-4, Ned Harmony (E. Kirkpatrick) 7-1, Linehan Direct (M. Coughlan) 2-2, five other starters, time 2:13 3-5 and 2:12 2-5; Miss Abner T. owned by H. T. Bridges, Gagetown, N.B., and Ned Harmony by W. H. Kirkpatrick, Saint John.

JOE AGAIN
At Inglewood, California, last Friday afternoon, Sunbelle, a four-year-old filly, set up a new world's pacing record for one and one-sixteenth miles, and also scored her 11th straight victory over the Inglewood track in the featured \$6,000 Shafter Pace. She was driven by Joe O'Brien of Alberton, and covered the distance in 2:05 1-5 — a full second under the former world's record set by Amortizer in 1956.

The winner was expected to be Widower Creed, but he finished fourth. Speedy Pick, another prime favorite, finished second, and W. D. Direct was third.

Joe O'Brien is certainly keeping up his prestige as a driver and trainer, and our readers will remember that at Delaware, Ohio, half-mile track, site of the Little Brown Jug classic, Sunbelle, on that same afternoon, became one of the first horses ever to better two minutes in two consecutive heats on a half-mile track.

Sunbelle was bred at the S.A. Camp Farms; she is by Mighty Sun 1:58 4-5, dam Adios Belle, both owned by the Camp Stables. This mare must be regarded as one of the top surprises of the year, because of the improvement she has shown.

Rider Tackle Tom Jones Is Ardent Music Lover

OTTAWA (CP)—Tom Jones eased his 275 pounds onto a couch as soothing music filled the room.

The six-foot-five-inch music lover, footballer and juvenile court constable had just returned from practice with Ottawa Rough Riders and was settling down for some relaxing music on his stereo set.

"There's nothing more relaxing," he says. "I've got nothing against the

folks who enjoy watching television but, personally, I get a much bigger kick out of my records.

"I'm guaranteed soothing music and the sort of entertainment I enjoy," he said.

\$4,000 INVESTMENT
Big Tom, one of the mainstays of the rugged line that helped Riders to second place in the Big Four football league, is something

of an authority on jazz. He estimates his collection of records and music equipment is worth at least \$4,000.

He is going to take a short vacation before reporting to his off-season job as a constable of the juvenile court in Cincinnati.

"Even if we go all the way to the Grey Cup final, and I'm not in the habit of making predictions, I think I'll take a little vacation," he said.

Jones traces Riders' late surge—seven wins in the last eight games after five losses—to the fact that the team now is getting a fair share of the breaks.

NEVER WERE BAD
"We never played bad football at any time," he said. "Now everything is going for us."

Jones has to have most of his clothes made specially. He takes a 48 extra tall or 50 in some makes of suits and for shirts the collar is 18½ inches with sleeve-lengths of 37 or 38.

Meanwhile, coach Frank Clair isn't taking the final game Saturday with Toronto too lightly and plans to dress all healthy players—that means everyone.

"Why quit now after we've come so far since the beginning of the season," Clair said. "If we stop fighting now it could continue into the playoffs. And I wouldn't want that to happen."

BRITISH COLUMBIA Lions have finally made it into the WIFU fold.

The good folks of Vancouver are surely deserving of a break and the Lions' surprise triumph over the Stampeders on Saturday last was a good thing for football in the west.

These Lions will try to roar with all their might on Saturday when they entertain the classy Edmonton Eskimos in the first game of a two-game total point series for the right to meet the Winnipeg Blue Bombers for the western crown.

The Lions will certainly not be favorites when they take to the field on Saturday but that should help rather than hurt them. After all, they were not supposed to make the playoffs but here they are still in the picture and oozing with ambition.

It's not likely that the Eskimos will fall victim this weekend and even if they do, they likely could make it up in points as they get back in the Alberta capital. It's almost a certainty that the Blue Bombers and Eskimos will be battling each other that trip to Toronto and the Grey Cup classic the final Saturday in November.

But the Lions won't concede without a real fight and this coming Saturday they might indeed throw a bit of a scare into Jackie Parker's outfit.

Since the underdog always gets lots of sympathy you can be sure that many football fans across this country will be pulling for a British Columbia triumph.

WINNIPEG BLUE BOMBERS lost a football game Monday night but after the affair was all over, the Bombers were awarded the contest because quarterback Frank Tripucka wasn't eligible to play with the Saskatchewan club. However, the Riders were already out of the playoffs, so the ruling didn't hurt them one bit. Neither did it help the Bombers who have first place clinched long ago.

It did, however, show that Tripucka can still play a lot of quarterback. Frank completed 17 of the 26 passes he threw and that was good for 207 yards.

That was indeed a far cry from some of his performances with Ottawa Roughriders for whom he toiled early this year. Apparently Tripucka, a former Notre Dame star has not lost his touch and football fans, regardless of whom they root for, will be glad to see that.

HANK GOLDUP, a former Toronto Maple Leaf player, has raised for the enthusiasm of young hockey players in the Maritimes.

Goldup spends a couple of weeks each year instructing at a hockey school in Kentville. The attendance was 350 this past July and that number is expected to jump by at least 100 next season. He is optimistic about the Maritimes producing National Hockey League stars in years to come.
