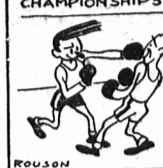

Woman Becomes President Of Red Wings

DETROIT, Dec. 14 — (AP) — Marguerite Ann Norris, who has never seen the Detroit Red Wings play in Olympia Stadium here Saturday became president of both Red Wings and Olympia Stadium.

The 25-year-old Miss Norris succeeds her late father, James D. Norris, as head of the Detroit National Hockey League empire. The youngest of four Norris children, she was chosen at a meeting of the heirs in Chicago.

Two brothers, James and Bruce, are executives of the Chicago Black Hawks, also of the National Hockey League, and James also is president of the International Boxing Club. The fourth heir is Mrs. Eleanor Kneibler.

General manager Jack Adams of Red Wings made the announcement of Miss Norris' selection. He said: "Marguerite Ann was selected to follow the prescribed wishes of her father."

Adams said that Miss Norris often had seen Red Wings in action in New York's Madison Square Garden and in the Chicago Stadium, but never had seen them play in Olympia. Miss Norris is a sports enthusiast who plays golf and tennis and is a yachtswoman.

Halifax Atlantics Edge Islanders 6-5 In Wild, Rough Game Saturday

HALIFAX, Dec. 14 — (CP) — Halifax Atlantics edged Charlottetown Islanders 6-5 here Saturday in one of the wildest, roughest Maritime Major Hockey League games ever seen in this city.

Murph Chamberlain, police and angry fans were central figures in the fracas.

The feud between the clubs—Charlottetown has won only one game against Atlantics this season—broke out in the closing minutes of the third period when goalie Roy McMeekin of Halifax tangled with Gary Gordon. Six more were involved in seconds.

At the height of excitement, Chamberlain lashed out at a spectator in a rinkside seat near the players' bench. When other spectators started to take a hand, the Islanders skated to the bench, sticks swinging.

The fan, an 18-year-old boy, was escorted away from Chamberlain to the Forum office by police and the fiery Islanders' coach was told to come along, too. He refused. Several husky constables finally pulled him clear of his players—who were holding him by the arms and waist—and took him to the office.

The youth said Chamberlain would be charged with assault but he changed his mind today. Meanwhile, on the ice, McMeekin sparred with Al Millar, the Charlottetown netminder. Both got majors.

Islanders refused to continue the game, until Referee Charlie Good told Captain Buck Whitlock he would draw a year's suspension from the CAHA if he took his team off the ice.

With two men from each team penalized, play continued and Billy Watson fired his second goal on a solo dash after a minute's play to put Halifax ahead 6-4. Islanders scored a little more than a minute before the final whistle. Atlantic opened the scoring after four minutes of play—with Ron Hurst serving a penalty—on a goal by Bill Ford. Whitlock tied the score before the period ended. Ford and Ken Lauffman put

Atlantics ahead 3-1 before Hub Beaudry scored late in the second. In the final Watson and Bonness tallied and Charlottetown rapped in two more off the sticks of Whitlock and Marcel Clements.

Then Watson scored the winner, followed by Charlottetown's goal by Beaudry.

Millionaires Staying To The Finish

SYDNEY, Dec. 14 — (CP)—Sydney Millionaires are definitely staying in the Maritime Major Hockey League to the finish, club president Art Lipton told an enthusiastic meeting of the Community Club shareholders tonight.

"Not only are we in to the finish... but we are in there to win. The players' spirits are 100 per cent and with a few additions we have an excellent opportunity of carrying off the Maritime major crown," he said.

Mr. Lipton asked shareholders and the public to ignore the "ill-founded reports and rumors" about Millionaires quitting the circuit. He did not comment on amalgamation with Glace Bay Miners, which had been rumored last week.

Discussing the player situation he said strings were out for two defencemen, and a centre. One would be a new playing-coach to take over more deliberate than that of either Gustaveson or Burega in Glace Bay a week ago, he stated.

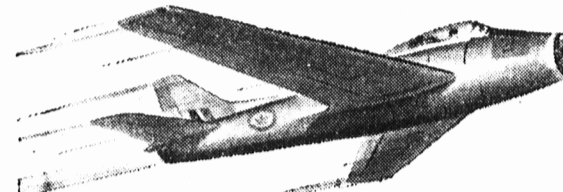
"I have enjoyed acting with you gentlemen and I know you will agree with me when I say that our relations have been most cordial at all times," he stated in the letter.

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Protects Fan Says Murph; No Charge Will Be Laid

Murph Chamberlain, the Battling Senator from St. Sebastian, Quebec, who shoved a fan into his seat in order to prevent him from being hit by a stick, will not be subject to any legal charges as the result of Saturday night's minor period scrap in Halifax between the Islanders and Atlantics.

The fan, an 18-year-old Halifax lad who left his seat near the Islanders bench to abuse one of the Charlottetown players at the start of the outbreak, laid assault charges against Chamberlain following the game but withdrew them yesterday.

Chamberlain, himself was carried out of the Halifax Forum by a corps of eight policemen following the battle which started on the ice and ended at the Islanders players' bench.

During an interview last night the Hardrock suggested that all fanatics should be kept away from the players benches during hockey games. Chamberlain stated the fan in question was abusing the players all night and during the fight matters came to a head.

The outbreak started between Gary Gordon and Bog Hayes of Halifax at the back of the Halifax net. MacMeekin, the Halifax goaltender made a stop and put his hand on the puck. Gordon took a hard swipe at the puck, hitting MacMeekin hard and drawing the anger of Hayes.

The two started to trade punches and MacMeekin got into the act. A few seconds later the Islanders goalie Al Millar came up the ice and exchanged blows with MacMeekin.

Then, according to Chamberlain things were almost straightened out when the young Halifax fan near the Islanders playing bench moved up to the boards and started abusing one of the players.

The over-heated player, waving his stick made for the fan and Chamberlain intervened by firing the fan back into his seat. The players crowded around Chamberlain waving their sticks to prevent further fan interference until the Police could get the matter in hand.

The Halifax Police Sergeant in charge of the detachment then asked Chamberlain to go into the Forum office. The Hardrock replied that as soon as the game was over he would go into the office whereupon the Policemen grabbed him and carried him bodily out of the Forum.

"They had no licence to take me off the bench," stated Chamberlain last night. "The referee never ordered me from the bench. There was only about four minutes left

in the game and I would have gone into the office of my own accord after the contest."

The Hardrock also had plenty to say about the five minute major which Joe LePine drew for cutting the Islanders "Hub" Beaudry. Chamberlain claimed that LePine should have received a match misconduct and be sent up before Judge Hudson for deliberate attempt to injure. His attack was

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
