# St. Thos. Aquinas Society In Session At Rustico

U.S. moons have never crossed, including Russia. Earlier American satellites had been aimed in a general East-West direction to take advantage of the earth's rotation.

Explorer IV is the biggest of four U.S. space vehicles, but still a midget in comparison with the 3,000-pound Soviet Sputnik III now soaring through the skies, sometimes visible to the naked eye like a shining star.

Explorer IV will seldom if ever be seen without the aid of a telescope, but in its journey through space it will be talking in a loud voice to eager scientists receiving its messages as it swings out and back in space between 162.9 and 1,373.3 miles from the earth's surface.

Scientists estimate that Explorer IV, an 80-inch-long tube, will whiz around the earth for five years.

They estimated that its speed ranges at 14,000 miles an hour to 18,000, depending on altitude. Its sole purpose is to measure the intensity of the deadly rays shooting through space and radio the information back to earth.

The first two Explorer satellites discovered the hot field of radiation, starting about 600 miles out.

The 70-foot-long rocket blasted off its launching pad at 11 a.m. EDT Saturday.

The Jupiter C now has a remarkable record of three launches in four attempts.



HEADS COMMITTEE

OTTAWA, (Special) — Heath N. Macquarrie, Conservative MP for Queens, has been elected chairman of the Commons standing committee on privileges and election. The selection was confirmed at an organizational meeting of the committee Saturday.

The committee, which will begin to hold meetings almost immediately, will concern itself mainly with recommendations for proposed amendments to the Canada Elections Act.

Several bills suggesting changes in the legislation have been introduced this session by CCP members.

Mr. Macquarrie, 39, junior MP for Queens, has also been serving on the banking and commerce, library and external affairs committees of the Commons.

A political scientist, professor and radio commentator, he was first elected to the Commons in 1957. He has held posts as professor at the University of New Brunswick, McGill, Brandon College and University of Toronto.

He has also been a lecturer at summer schools at Acadia, Mount Allison and Manitoba universities.

**Call Copter To Fight B.C. Fires**  
VANCOUVER (CP) — A big Sikorsky helicopter has been called in to help battle British Columbia's continuing forest fire menace.

The aircraft, chartered by the provincial forest service, is being used to transport men and equipment to four blazes in the Campbell River district of northern Vancouver Island.

The forest service said at least 277 fires were burning in the province, during the weekend, the most serious in the central Prince George area where about \$1,000,000 acres of valuable timberland has been destroyed.

U.S. moons have never crossed, including Russia. Earlier American satellites had been aimed in a general East-West direction to take advantage of the earth's rotation.

Explorer IV is the biggest of four U.S. space vehicles, but still a midget in comparison with the 3,000-pound Soviet Sputnik III now soaring through the skies, sometimes visible to the naked eye like a shining star.

Explorer IV will seldom if ever be seen without the aid of a telescope, but in its
