On Thursday the large Newfoundland motor schooner, Maxwell F. Corkum, under command of Captain Roberts arrived in Georgetown. Enroute from Port Aux Basques, Newfoundland to Charlottetown she made Georgetown harbour due to the recent storm in the Gulf. Plans to proceed to Charlottetown were changed and the J. A. MacDonald Company of Cardigan commenced loading at the Railway Wharf in Georgetown on Friday morning with a cargo of general produce for Newfoundland.

A large number of passengers and a considerable quantity of general freight and produce are conveyed each season over this water route.

Mr. Albert Jesso who operates one of Mr. William S. Martell's lobster smacks, had an unforgettable experience during the gale force wind on Wednesday night. Enroute to Georgetown from Launching with forty crates of lobsters aboard, the engine in the smack stopped functioning after becoming wet, when the boat was nearing the Burnt Point side of the Cardigan river mouth. Mr. Jesso put out an anchor, which failed to hold the boat against the high wind and dragging the anchor she finally drifted ashore on the De Gros Marsh side at about 1.00 A. M. after drifting for several hours. Mr. Jesso who was alone in the boat waded ashore and received assistance and shelter at a nearby farm house. The following day the boat and cargo intact were towed to Georgetown. During this wind storm several fishing boats, anchored in the gully on the south side of Boughton Island filled and sank. About the town the only damage reported was when a large plate glass window in the vacant store owned by Mr. J. Howard MacDonald, on the corner of Main and Water Streets, was blown in.
